Fortunately, the partnership went away and came back with plans to focus on just two areas; energy use and transport with the view to agreeing a methodology for measuring carbon footprints. In February 2009, the partnership agreed its collective CO2 emissions baseline (33,775 tonnes) and a reduction target of 2,055 tonnes to be achieved by Feb 2010.
