Report of the Licensing Officer

1. Introduction

- 1.1 The Licensing Act 2003 (the Act) allows applicants to apply for a premises licence at any time. In this case, an application was received on 11 August 2011 from Bath Road Market Ltd. in respect of Bath Road Market, 252 Bath Road, Cheltenham, GL53 7NB. A copy of the application is included at **Appendix A**. Location and site plans are attached at **Appendix B** and **C**.
- 1.2 The applicant has applied for a premises licence to permit:-

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2. Application (Ref. 11/01563/PRMA)

- 2.1 Applicant: Bath Road Market Ltd.
- 2.2 Agent: N/A
- 2.3 Premises: Bath Road Market, 252 Bath Road, Cheltenham, GL53 7NB
- 2.4 Steps to promote the four licensing objectives that are identified in this application: From the application form:
 - Stringent ID checking prior to sale of alcohol 'Check 23' to be in place throughout
 - A clear and legible notice outside the premises indicating the normal hours under the terms of the premises licence that licensable activities are permitted.
 - Numbers of visitors attending the Market venue will be monitored and regulated accordingly.
 - Promotions by vendors at the market for the sale of alcohol will be monitored and discouraged at all times.
 - All fire exits will be clearly labelled and kept clear from restriction
 - Adequate access for emergency personnel will be provided
 - Music will be limited in loudness to represent no more than ambience / background.
 - Music outside will only be appropriate when external market stalls are in operation.
 Music is not the attraction of the Market but only present to enhance the shopping experience.
 - All traffic directly associated with the market is to be directed to the car park at the Norwood Arms pub. Stringent systems for loading and unloading have been put in place, all stall holders are given notice of these systems in the enrolment package and must agree to conditions laid out.

3. Responsible Authorities

Gloucestershire Constabulary – The Constabulary have agreed with the applicant that the following additional conditions will be applied to the licence:

- A CCTV system shall be maintained in good working order, shall record at all times the
 premises are open, and recordings shall be kept for a minimum of 14 days and be provided
 on DVD to Officers of the Council, Trading Standards or Police on request.
- The Challenge 25 (or equivalent scheme) shall be adopted, so that any customer attempting
 to purchase alcoholic liquor who appears to be under the age of 25 shall be asked for an
 accredited photographic proof of their age (e.g. passport, photo driving licence or a Pass
 approved card) and that a sale shall not be made unless this evidence is produced. This will
 only be treated as a breach where the customer subsequently turns out to be under 18 years
 of age.
- Signage shall be displayed on all exits in regular use by customers informing them that they are now entering a no drinking zone.
- Alcohol shall not be displayed within 4 metres of any entrance/exit door in regular use by customers

Responsible Authorities - No representations were received from the other responsible authorities

4. Interested Parties

Representations have been received from seven people residing in the vicinity of the premises, as interested parties under the Act. Those representations are attached at **Appendix D**

5. Local Policy Considerations

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- 5.1 The 2003 Act introduces a unified system of regulation through two new types of licenses: the premises licence and the personal licence (club premises certificates for qualifying clubs). The Borough Council, as the licensing authority, is responsible for licensing all outlets in the borough that sell or supply alcohol or carry out any other 'licensable activities'; public entertainment, theatre, cinema, or late night refreshment.
- 5.2 The new system is underpinned by four objectives: i) the prevention of crime and disorder; ii) public safety; iii) the prevention of public nuisance; and, iv) the protection of children from harm. The licensing authority must promote these objectives in carrying out its functions.
- 5.3 The Councils adopted licensing policy statement (Council 30/03/09) includes the following:
 - i) **Each objective is of equal importance** and the licensing authority has developed policies relating to each objective. The objectives are the only matters to be taken into account in determining applications and applying conditions. **(Paragraph 1.2)**
 - ii) The licensing authority will only apply terms and conditions to licences which promote one or more of the licensing objectives and are relevant to the individual circumstances of the application. Conditions may be drawn from those set out in Appendix B and / or tailored to particular circumstances and they will be focused on matters within the control of the individual licensees and others granted relevant permissions. (Paragraph 2.4)
 - iii) The licensing authority will expect all individual applicants to address the licensing objectives in their operating schedule having regard to the premises, the licensable activities to be provided, the operational procedures, the nature of the location and the interests of the local community. The licensing authority expects that any conditions that are necessary will, in the first instance, be identifiable from prospective licensees or certificate holders' risk assessments.
 - iv) Applicants will have to translate their assessments into measures which promote one or more of the licensing objectives and record them in their operating schedule. (Paragraph 2.5)
 - v) The licensing authority will not impose any conditions unless, following the receipt of relevant representations, it has used its discretion at a hearing and been satisfied of the validity of those concerns. (Paragraph 2.5)
 - vi) The licensing authority will consider every application on its individual merits with regard to this policy statement and to the Licensing Committee's Probity Code (available at www.cheltenham.gov.uk under 'L' in the A-Z of services). The licensing authority will seek to balance the needs of the wider community, local community and commercial premises and activities, against those who may be concerned about adverse impacts from licensed premises. The views of vocal individuals or groups will not necessarily prevail over the general interests of the community. In every case the licensing authority will focus on disproportionate or unreasonable impacts of the licensable activities on people living, working and sleeping in the vicinity. (Paragraph 2.7)
 - vii) Cheltenham Borough Council, in its role as a licensing authority, wishes to do all in its power to protect the amenity of residents and businesses in the vicinity of licensed premises, and for these purposes 'vicinity' is taken to mean the immediate area around licensed premises. As the council is fully aware of the importance of the licensed trade in terms of the local economy and its culture and leisure aspiration, it will seek to work in partnership with all interested parties to ensure a mutual and productive co-existence. (Paragraph 7.2)

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- viii) When considering licence applications, the licensing authority will take into account the location of the premises and the type and construction of the building as well as the adequacy of measures proposed to deal with the potential for nuisance and / or antisocial behaviour having regard to all the circumstances of the application. (Paragraph 7.4)
- ix) The licensing authority will consistently seek to ensure that its judgements about what constitutes public nuisance are balanced, as are decisions about any conditions that are considered necessary to prevent it. (Paragraph 7.5)
- x) In reaching a judgement on the individual merits of applications, the licensing authority will have regard to the implications for nuisance generation and the impacts on residents that are posed by operating hours and types of regulated entertainment. The licensing authority will take into account requests for terminal hours in the light of the:-
 - environmental quality,
 - residential amenity,
 - character or function of a particular area,
 - nature of the proposed activities to be provided at the premises.

Consideration may, however, be given to imposing stricter controls on noise and disturbance from particular licensed premises, such as those in mainly residential areas. (Paragraph 10.6)

6. National Guidance

- 6.1 Guidance has been issued under Section 182 of The Licensing Act 2003.
- 6.2 Para 2.32 of the Guidance states "The 2003 Act requires licensing authorities (following receipt of relevant representations) and responsible authorities, through representations, to make judgements about what constitutes public nuisance and what is necessary to prevent it in terms of conditions attached to specific premises licences and club premises certificates. It is therefore important that in considering the promotion of this licensing objective, licensing authorities and responsible authorities focus on impacts of the licensable activities at the specific premises on persons living and working (including doing business) in the vicinity that are disproportionate and unreasonable, The issues will mainly concern noise nuisance, light pollution, noxious smells and litter."
- 6.3 Para 2.33 of the Guidance states "Public nuisance is given a statutory meaning in many pieces of legislation. It is however not narrowly defined in the 2003 Act and retains its broad common law meaning. It is important to remember that the prevention of public nuisance could therefore include low-level nuisance perhaps affecting a few people living locally as well as major disturbance affecting the whole community. It may also include in appropriate circumstances the reduction of the living and working amenity and environment of interested parties (as defined in the 2003 Act) in the vicinity of licensed premises."

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- Para 2.35 of the Guidance states "As with all conditions, it will be clear that conditions relating to noise nuisance may not be necessary in certain circumstances where the provisions of the Environmental Protection Act 1990, the Noise Act 1996, or the Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005 adequately protect those living in the vicinity of the premises. But as stated earlier in this Guidance, the approach of Licensing authorities and responsible authorities should be one of prevention and when their powers are engaged, licensing authorities should be aware of the fact that other legislation may not adequately cover concerns raised in relevant representations and additional conditions may be necessary."
- Para 2.36 of the Guidance states "Where applications have given rise to representations, any necessary and appropriate conditions should normally focus on the most sensitive periods. For example, music noise from premises usually occurs from mid-evening until either late evening or early morning when residents in adjacent properties may be attempting to go to sleep or are sleeping in certain circumstances, conditions maybe necessary."
- 6.6 Para 2.37 of the Guidance states "Measures to control light pollution will also require careful thought. Bright lighting outside premises considered necessary to prevent crime and disorder may itself give rise to light pollution for some neighbours. Applicants, Licensing authorities and responsible authorities will need to balance these issues."
- 6.7 Para 2.38 of the Guidance states "In the context of preventing public nuisance, it is again essential that conditions are focused on measures within the direct control of the licence holder or club. Conditions relating to public nuisance caused by the anti-social behaviour of customers once they are beyond the control of the licence holder, club or premises management cannot be justified and will not serve to promote the licensing objectives."
- 6.8 Para 9.8 of the Guidance states "A representation will only be relevant if it is likely to effect the grant of the licence on the promotion of at least one of the licensing objectives."
- 6.9 Para 10.9 of the Guidance states "The 2003 Act provides that where an operating schedule or club operating schedule has been submitted with an application and there have been no relevant representations made by responsible authorities, the licence or certificate must be granted subject only to such conditions as are consistent with the schedule accompanying the application and any mandatory conditions required by the Act itself."
- 6.10 Para 10.11 of the Guidance states "The licensing authority may not impose conditions unless its discretion has been engaged following relevant representations and it has been satisfied at a hearing of the necessity to impose conditions. It may only then impose conditions that are necessary to promote one or more of the licensing objectives. Such conditions must also be expressed in unequivocal and unambiguous terms to avoid legal dispute."
- 6.11 Para 10.13 of the Guidance on proportionality states "The Act requires that Licensing conditions should be tailored to the size, style, characteristics and activities taking place at the premises concerned. This rules out standardised conditions which ignore these individual aspects. It is important that conditions are proportionate and properly recognise significant differences between venues."

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- 6.12 Para 10.15 of the Guidance states with regard to duplication with other statutory provisions that "Licensing Authorities should only impose conditions which are necessary and proportionate for the promotion for the licensing objectives. If other existing law already places certain statutory responsibilities on an employer or operator of premises, it cannot be necessary to impose the same or similar duties."
- 6.13 Paragraph 10.20 of the Guidance states there is no general presumption in favour of lengthening licensing hours and the four licensing objectives should be paramount considerations at all times. Where there are objections to an application and the committee believes that changing the licensing hours would undermine the licensing objectives, they may reject the application or grant it with appropriate conditions and/or different hours from those requested.

7. Licensing Comments

- 7.1 Taking into consideration the merits of the application and representations made the committee must, in determining this application, take such steps as it considers necessary to promote the four licensing objectives. These being;
 - (a) the prevention of crime and disorder,
 - (b) public safety,
 - (c) the prevention of public nuisance, and
 - (d) the protection of children from harm.
- 7.2 Furthermore, Members must have regard to the guidance issued by the Secretary of State and the Council's adopted policy statement.
- 7.3 In light of the above, Members can only give consideration to representations that relates to the likely effect the grant of this licence will have on the promotion of the licensing objectives.
- 7.4 As previously mentioned, seven representations from interested parties were received during the 28 day consultation period.
- 7.5 For the reason above, Members are to note that representations relating to parking should not be considered relevant unless it can be shown to pose a public safety risk or could compromise the protection of children from harm.
- 7.6 With regards to representation relating to crime and disorder, Members are to note that this is an application for a new licence where previously no such licence existed. Members must therefore decide what weight to add to crime and disorder representations bearing in mind that no evidence relating specifically to the premises would exist given that it is a new licensed premises, the fact the no objection from Gloucestershire Constabulary was made and the conditions agreed between the applicant and the constabulary.
- 7.7 Members are also to note comments relating to the existence or other licensed premises in the vicinity of the premises must not be considered relevant by virtue of the fact that each application must be determined on individual merits.
- 7.8 Noise emanating from deliveries and litter should be dealt with under the Environmental Protection Act to avoid statutory duplication.
- 7.9 In relation to the representation by Mr Siddall, Members are to note that Health and Safety is not a licensing objective and should not for that reason be considered relevant.

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- 7.10 The steps identified in the operating schedule submitted with the application listed on 2.4 of this report will, where appropriate, become conditions attached to the licence if granted.
- 7.11 The Committee must have regard to all of the representations made and the evidence it hears. The Committee must take such of the following steps as it considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives which can include:
 - Granting the application as requested;
 - Modifying the conditions and or times of operation attached to the licence; or

Rejecting all or part of the application.

Stringent ID checking prior to sale of Alcohol 'Check 23' to be in place throughout Bath Road Market. All stall holders selling Alcohol will only be allowed to trade if they conform with the 'Check 23' system, appropriate signage will be in place

Appropriate Non-smoking signage in place at entrance to the market Building and through-out. Placing of appropriate containers for the extinguishing of cigarettes prior to entering onto the forecourt of the building.

All staff at the Market will wear uniform of an Apron embroidered/printed with the Market Logo for ease of recognition.

b) The prevention of crime and disorder

A clear and legible notice outside the premises indicating the normal hours under the terms of the Premises License that licensable activities are permitted. Clear and conspicuous notices warning of potential criminal activity such as pick-pocketing and shop lifting which may target visitors and stall holders and the subsequent outcomes to the perpetrators. Numbers of visitors attending the Market venue will be monitored and regulated accordingly.

Member of Bath Road Traders Association and the 'round robin' phone scheme in place, liaising with community Police Officer Ross Nicholl.

Promotions by vendors at the market for the sale of alcohol will be monitored and discouraged at all times.

c) Public safety

All fire exits will be clearly labeled and kept clear from restriction including visitors to the Market, staff or stall holders at all times. Where hung between stalls curtains will not touch the floor and shall draw freely and not obstruct doorways or public routes through the Market. A first aid box/kit will be clearly visible and available if needed. Adequate access for emergency personnel will be provided.

All parts of the premises and all fittings and apparatus therein, door fastenings and notices and seating, lighting, electrical, sanitary accommodation, washing facilities and other installations, will be maintained at all times in good order and in a safe condition. All parts of the premises will be adequately illuminated in the event of failure of general lighting the public shall be required to leave the premises forthwith.

No work in connection with alterations or repairs to areas accessible to the public will be carried out during opening hours with the exception of emergency works when the specific area will be isolated and supervised at all times.

People leaving the Market will be encouraged to dispose of possible litter in bins provided near exits. Stall holders will remove all their unsold stock and associated packaging. Cardboard will be recycled by Bath Road Market.

Music will be limited in loudness to represent no more than Ambience / background. Music outside will only be appropriate when external market stalls are in operation. Music is not the attraction of the Market but only present to enhance the shopping experience.

All traffic directly associated with the market is to be directed to the car park at the Norwood Arms pub. Stringent systems for loading and unloading have been put in place, all stall holders are given notice of these systems in the enrollment package and must agree to conditions laid out regarding loading/unloading and parking prior to being able to trade on this site. In addition would be shoppers and visitors are directed to the car parking facilities on Bath Road via the web site and once operating, signage will be in place.

e) The protection of children from harm

Stringent ID checking – Alcohol not to be available to young people under 18 years of age. Where samples of Alcoholic drinks are made available, these will be distributed by the stall holder and consumed in the presence of the stall holder within the system for ID checking. To make the alcoholic nature of products clearly known, to avoid confusion with non-alcoholic drinks.

With the exception of alcohol, any goods for sale on market stalls that are deemed unsuitable or harmful to children will be removed and banned from sale. (All stall holders must apply for a position at the market and supply details of the goods they will be offering for sale).





Objection to licence application for 252 Old Bath Road, New Bath Road Market.

We are writing to object to the granting of the above application. We live in Langdon Road, next to the market.

The market has traded for its first day and we note a temporary licence was granted for this event.

Langdon Road is the start of the residential area of Leckhampton and on the edge of the conservation area. The first days market has already been disruptive with both traders and customers illegally parking, including over the corner of the drop curb crossing at the corner of Langdon Road and Bath Road. Also, the open rear of the property has been used for the first time, previously used for plants and this had an impact on general noise levels. The fencing at the rear is above waist height, wire mesh, which has no sound reduction.

We would like the application to be objected for the following specific additional reasons:

The following issues relate to Recorded/Live Music and the Sale of Alcohol:

Noise/Disturbance:

- The building is of a greenhouse type structure and would not have sufficient noise reduction to be heard outside.
- The open back is adjacent and very close to the neighbouring houses in an otherwise very quiet road.
- Further noise will have a direct impact on our quality of life and enjoyment, particularly at weekends.

Health & Safety:

- Space is limited as the plans show and activities which would cause people to group may be unsafe.
- Any activities which encourage people to group or congregate at specific times would have impact on this location, which is limited in size and is a quiet residential road.

After the first market there were problems with traffic which Paul attempted to discuss with market owner. He was combative rather than receptive and we feel that this would be a hindrance to resolving any issues if a licence was granted.

I wish to object to the Granting of a Licence for sale and supply of alcohol and live music to Bath Road Market on the following grounds.

The main market building is essentially a greenhouse constructed mainly of glass with a plastic roof. The other half of the premises is open air. The market is situated on the edge of a shopping area and is surrounded by residential properties. It is difficult to see how noise commonly related to music/alcohol consumption can be contained in this environment. The Public Houses in the area have restrictions in place meaning that windows and doors must be kept shut to minimise any noise pollution, however, this would not be possible in this case due to the construction of the building and the open air nature of the premises.

The opening times are until 6pm Mon, Tues, Weds, Sun and until 8pmThurs, Fri and Sat. Granting a licence would have a serious impact on the peace and quiet of the adjoining residential area where residents would not be able to open windows or enjoy their gardens, particularly at weekends.

There is mention in the notice of holding 'plays'. I assume this means that there would be activities which would cause people to congregate together. This combined with the sale of alcohol could lead to disturbances which are already not uncommon due to the number of public houses in the vicinity.

The market has only been open for 2 days and already there have been incidents with illegal parking and obstruction of pedestrian crossings.

Dear Sir/Madam,

As a resident of long standing resident Of Langdon Road, Cheltenham [the one that runs down the side of the proposed new market site], I am emailing to express some concerns I have.

- 1 Parking is already a huge problem in this area for residents as you know. When Robert Young's was in operation, it was most of the time impossible to park within the road I live due to staff from the shop and the general public, who were not willing to pay to park in the public car park on the Bath Road, choosing to park in this residential road. This had a big impact on my life and that of my neighbours, many of which are elderly with mobility problems or have young families. This brings into consideration the Public Safety and Protection of Children From Harm issues. The new market with up to 40 traders loading and unloading their vehicles on a daily basis is going to have a huge impact on parking for residents again [just when things had started to improve for us]. Traders and the general public will once again use my road as a public car park.
- 2 Noise will become an issue I'm sure. This brings in The Prevention of Public Nuisance. Why should we have our lives affected by traders loading and unloading at all hours of the day, and as for the music licence, I strongly oppose this as I do not want to live at a pop concert or festival site thank you. My neighbours of all ages feel the same. Initially the license is only till p.m. I think, but how long will it be before extensions to those licensing hours are applied for?
- 3 Crime and anti social behaviour is unfortunately on the increase in this area, especially since the local police station on the Leckhampton Road has been forced to close. This raises the issues of Public Safety, The Prevention of Crime and Disorder, The Protection of Children from Harm and The Prevention of Public Nuisance. The potential problems of people in a jovial mood carrying out random acts of crime and vandalism is not appealing.

I am sorry if I sound very negative about the proposed plans, but I have the well being of both myself and my neighbours to consider. It is with these thoughts that i wish to clarify that i object to the licence applied for concerning the allowing of Alcohol/Live Music/Recorded Music and Market on the old Robert Young's site, Bath Road, Leckhampton, Cheltenham.

I am contacting you to express my objections regarding the proposed licence for the new Bath Road market.

Why is a licence for alcohol needed for these premises when within close proximity there are 4 pubs (Norwood Arms, The Brown Jug, The Five Alls and The Exmouth) as well as 2 supermarkets (Sainsburys and the Co-operative) as well as a Bargain Booze which surely is more than enough in this limited area? We already have seen the effects of people becoming inebriated and carrying out random acts of vandalism, in fact, only last week the window of a car outside my house was smashed for no apparent reason. This brings in concerns regarding the issues of Public Safety, The Prevention of Crime and Disorder, The Protection of Children from Harm and The Prevention of Public Nuisance. Crime and antisocial behaviour is already on the increase and we have unfortunately have had the enforced closure of the police station in Leckhampton Road recently.

I have been a resident in Langdon Road for over 24 years and have seen problems with parking increasing over time in this residential area. This new market with up to 40 traders loading and unloading their vehicles 7 days a week will have an enormous impact on parking for residents yet again as things had become easier since Robert Young had closed as their staff and the public used the road for parking as they were unwilling to pay to use the public car park therefore making it very difficult for us to park within our road. My neighbours' ages are very variable from the elderly with mobility issues to very young children and this brings to mind the Public Safety and Protection of Children From Harm issues bearing in mind that children also use this road to access their way to and from the local school and play outside.

I am extremely concerned regarding the noise levels. Not only are we going to have our lives affected by the impact of noise from traders loading and unloading their vehicles but also from the proposal for a music licence. Why do we have to contend with this as surely we should be able to sit in our gardens without being forced to listen to music (live or recorded) or to live plays, where does this leave my Human Rights? I do not wish to live at an open air concert/festival venue. The noise will bring in issues of the Prevention of Public Nuisance. The licence is initially proposed until 20.00hours but how long will it be before an application is made for an extension to these hours?

Many of my neighbours, young and old, have raised their concerns to me over this issues.

I would like to clarify to you that I strongly object to the application for having Alcohol, Live Music, Recorded Music at the new Bath Road Market.

What are your concerns?

My concerns regarding this application are that, if granted, the license may at some point in the future be used to put on frequent live entertainment and alcoholic drink being regularly served on the premises until late into the evening, to all intents and purposes a pub. This could generate much noise and potential anti-social behaviour along our street, particularly given the open-air nature of the premises at the back of the building. It could also generate problems of litter and all the associated anti-social behaviour that comes with a licensed venue.

<u>Suggested suitable conditions that if agreed in advance of a hearing by the applicant would allow you to withdraw your representation or that the committee etc</u>

I understand that the applicants are planning limited purchase of alcohol and occasional live events and I think this is fine. My concern is that the license, once granted, could be used to set up something on a much bigger scale at a later date. Perhaps the license could be granted on the basis of the terms within the applicant's letter, currently posted on the doors of the premises? Any change to these terms would need permission from the council. Is this feasible?

Overall I think the market is a nice idea and understand that they would need a license to sell things like local cider on stalls and serve mulled wine at Christmas markets for example and that they would play recorded music and have occasional live music events. However the license itself grants permission for much more than this and once the license is granted there would be nothing we could do to prevent the premises turning into a live music pub every day of the week until late into the evening.
