Licensing Act 2003: Determination of Application for a Premises Licence

For The St James' Club, Gibson House. Cheltenham. GL50 3QG

Case Officer: Jason Kirkwood - Senior Licensing Officer

Introduction

- 1. The Licensing Act 2003 (the 2003 Act) introduced a unified system of regulation through four types of authorisation to permit licensable activity:-
- The premises licence,
- The club premises certificates for qualifying clubs,
- Temporary Event Notices and
- The personal licence.
- 2. Licensable activity is defined under the 2003 Act as the following:-
- The sale by retail or the supply of alcohol,
- Regulated entertainment (recorded and live music, performance of a play, exhibition of a film, etc)
- Late night refreshment (food or drink supplied above ambient temperature between the hours of 23:00 and 05:00).
- 3. Since the implementation of the 2003 Act, Central Government has issued Statutory Guidance (the Guidance) to provide more comprehensive and detailed advice on this legislation. It was last updated on 6 April 2018. The licensing authority must have regard to the Guidance when determining this application.
- 4. The Guidance is binding on Cheltenham Borough Council acting in its capacity as a licensing authority under the 2003 Act. However, the licensing authority may depart from it, if it has good reason to do so. Departure from this Guidance could give rise to an appeal or judicial review, and so clear reasons must be referenced in such instances.
- 5. The 2003 Act requires that a council must formulate and publish a statement of its licensing policy. This will explain the manner in which the licensing authority will carry out its responsibilities under the 2003 Act. The licensing authority may depart from the Statement of Licensing Policy (the Policy), but must give good reason(s) where it chooses to do so.
- 6. The Guidance and Policy are both referenced: through elements of this report, through a summary of the most relevant extracts from each attached as appendices and by way of weblinks to both documents.

- 7. The Borough Council, as the licensing authority, is responsible for authorising all venues/ events in the borough where licensable activities take place.
- 8. The legislation provides a clear focus on the promotion of four statutory objectives which must be considered when licensing functions are undertaken.
- 9. The system is built upon four licensing objectives:-
- The prevention of crime and disorder;
- Public safety;
- The prevention of public nuisance; and,
- The protection of children from harm.
- 10. The licensing authority must promote these objectives in carrying out its functions.
- 11. Each objective is of equal importance. There are no other <u>statutory</u> licensing aims or objectives, although other aims and objectives may be pursued through local policy.
- 12. Where an application is made to the licensing authority, the default position is that the application will be granted, as applied for, unless relevant representations (objections) are received. If relevant representations are received, a hearing must be held to consider the application, in light of the objections and/ or any support for it.
- 13. An objection against an application must refer to the promotion of one or more of the licensing objectives to be considered as a relevant representation, and must be made by a Responsible Authority or an 'Other Person'.
- 14. Responsible Authorities: The 2003 Act identifies 10 responsible authorities that act as statutory consultees for applications for premises licences. All of these consultees are served with a copy of the application and have the opportunity to object or make comment:-
- The relevant Licensing Authority,
- The Chief Officer of Police
- The local Fire and Rescue Authority
- The relevant health and safety enforcing authority
- The local authority with responsibility for environmental health
- The local Planning Authority
- The relevant body with responsibility for the protection of children
- The relevant Public Health Authority
- Trading Standards
- Home Office Immigration Enforcement (on behalf of the Secretary of State).
- 15. Other Persons The 2003 Act allows any individual, body or business to make representations to the licensing authority regarding an application for a premises licence, where their comments relate to the promotion of the licensing objectives.
- 16. Mediation In some cases, mediation by the licensing authority has the potential to find a satisfactory conclusion for all parties, and a hearing may be dispensed with, if all parties agree. Due to the volume of representations, it has not seemed realistic for mediation to produce such an outcome in this case.

Policy Considerations

- 17. Core Hours for Licensable Activities As set down in the Policy the council will avoid arbitrary restrictions on licensing hours that undermine the principles of flexibility and consideration of each application is on its own merit.
- 18. However, the council believes that licensable activities carried on within the core hours set out below will generally not have a harmful impact on the licensing objectives, address the concerns raised by local residents and businesses and are usually less likely to attract representations.
- 19. Furthermore, earlier closing will result in less alcohol consumption and drunkenness and would also be consistent with the ability to get crowds dispersed from the town centre.

- 20. As set down in Appendix D of the Policy, the location for the St James' Club is defined as a 'town centre' location.
- 21. Where relevant representations have been made, the sub committee will take the following matters into consideration when making a decision, as per the Policy. These are not a definitive list and other matters may be considered:
 - a) Operating schedules demonstration of compliance with management standards to support each of the licensing objectives.
 - b) Proximity to residential accommodation the likelihood of the operation to have an adverse impact on the peace and quiet of local residents.
 - c) Potential noise and nuisance from people leaving and entering the premises.
 - d) Ability to demonstrate that systems in place to ensure timely dispersal of customers away from residential areas.

- e) Use of external areas for carrying out the licensable activities and potential noise impact on local residents.
- f) Proposed hours of the licensing activities and general opening times for the public The use of winding down periods to enable more efficient dispersal.
- g) Type of use alcohol led premises such as pubs, bars and nightclubs, off licenses and hot food take away premises are more likely to be associated with crime and disorder and public nuisance than other premises such as seated restaurants, theatres, cinemas and other cultural activities.
- h) Availability of public transport to assist in the timely dispersal of customers from the vicinity and to ensure safe travel home.
- i) The potential for contamination of the street environment through increased litter and other pollution of the streets by customers

The Determination of an Application

- 22. Where relevant representations have been received and mediation is unsuccessful or not viable, then the licensing authority's discretion will be engaged. It will convene a hearing by a sub committee of the Licensing Committee to consider the application and representations.
- 23. Responsible authorities and/or other persons in relation to an application may attend the hearing, with adequate notice, to <u>amplify and clarify</u> their relevant comments. They may not add to their original representation once the objection period has closed.
- 24. The applicant may also attend the hearing to assist the authority in considering the application.
- 25. The hearing should focus on the steps considered appropriate to promote the particular licensing objective or objectives that have given rise the representations and not stray into undisputed areas.
- 26. The sub committee should determine the application with a view to promoting the licensing objectives in the overall interests of the local community. The licensing authority must give appropriate weight to:-
 - The Statutory Guidance the current version is available to view here (the most relevant extracts to this case are attached at **Appendix 5** of this report).
 - The Cheltenham Borough Council Statement of Licensing Policy the current version is available to view here (the most relevant extracts are attached at **Appendix 6** of this report).
 - The representations (including supporting information) presented by all the parties.
 (Attached at Appendix 3 a j).
 - The steps that are appropriate to promote the licensing objectives.

The Application

Licence type – premises licence

Address: Basement, Gibson House, St. James Square, Cheltenham. GL50 3QG

- 27. Other information: the premises will be known as 'the St James' Club'. Many objectors have referred to the name as 'Chemistry', as a venue operating in the past from this location was known under that name.
- 28. A sub committee is required to discharge its duty and determine this application with a view to promoting the licensing objectives. This is because relevant representations have been made against the application.
- 29. The application is attached at **Appendix 1** and details the hours sought for licensable activity to take place. It includes the steps the applicant would take to promote the licensing objectives at Section M if the application is granted.
- 30. The application was received on 19th February 2020 and was deemed as duly made at that point. The close of the objection period was 19th March 2020. The application was sent electronically to all responsible authorities and public notice of the application was given by way of site notice and a notice in a local newspaper. An objector reported the site notice missing at one point, however an officer checked the site notice and it was still in place.
- 31. The application was accompanied by a plan of the premises, which is attached at **Appendix 2**. The location of the proposed venue is shown by way of area maps highlighting Gibson House at **Appendix 4 a d**.

Relevant Representations

- 32. During the objection period there were no relevant representations received from any responsible authority.
- 33. However, there were a relatively significant number of relevant representations from other persons. The breakdown of the relevant representations is as follows:-

Total letters/ email/ forms received - 194 (1 objection was withdrawn leaving this final total)

168 from individuals

21 from couples/ families/ persons living together representing 2 persons objecting

3 from local businesses/ organisations

1 from a Ward Councillor

1 from a 5 person household

Total named objectors – 219

67 of the above objectors describe themselves as parishioners of the church

- 10 of the above objectors describe a direct link with the school/ nursery.
- 34. It should be noted that where objections only referred to the licensing objectives by name, further information was requested as far as possible.
- 35. All relevant representations are attached at **Appendix 3 a j**. They have been batched alphabetically as far as possible, each batch is manually page numbered and they are

redacted to remove names, signatures and personal contact information (telephone numbers and email addresses). **Appendix 3 j** contains 2 representations out of that order, due to an administrative error.

Hearing

- 36. It is clear that Government has a clear priority for the justice system, council meetings generally and regulatory functions to continue to be maintained, as far as practicable, notwithstanding the challenges faced by society through the measures introduced to tackle COVID 19.
- 37. In usual circumstances, the hearing would have taken place prior to 18th April 2020. However, the sub committee determined that the period within which the hearing should usually be held, as laid down in Statutory Instrument 2005 no. 44, should be extended for up to 3 months. This was because of the acute difficulties of holding it at the time due to the national emergency in relation to COVID 19, in particular with no physical meeting possible. The high number of objectors, the apparent age dynamic of many of them and the likely difficulties in providing access to and managing a meeting through online means alone led to this decision.
- 38. However, the council will make its best endeavours to ensure that the hearing is held on 2nd July 2020, as it would be inappropriate to delay the matter further. It is hoped that certain government measures may have been relaxed slightly by that time, and with proper coordination and management, the hearing can be held by way of a combination of a physical meeting (with social distancing measures) and online facilities to view and take part in the meeting.
- 39. The council is currently preparing to deliver certain council meetings 'virtually', whereby the public/ councillors can view and/ or take part in meetings through online conference facilities. It is hoped to use those same facilities and a physical meeting through limited means to ensure access to the hearing, the right for all parties to be heard and provide transparency about the decision making process. Further information will be made available about how the hearing will be managed nearer to the time, as it will be dependent on a number of factors and ultimately the health and safety of all persons involved in this process.
- 40. In any event, the council appreciates that not all parties will want to attend the meeting in person, but it understands that they will want their views to be considered. Further, the council understands that many objectors may face difficulties in accessing a meeting online, and so may be hindered in engaging fully with the process.
- 41. Therefore, it seems prudent to ensure that objectors can voice their concerns through their local ward councillors and/ or a representative of their choosing. This approach has been taken by many councils where there are a number of objections to an application under 'normal business' circumstances.
- 42. It is worth bearing in mind that normal practice at hearings would involve parties not repeating the points that have already been made to the sub committee on the day. Furthermore, the sub committee will consider all written representations in any event, and the hearing itself is the opportunity for parties to only 'amplify and clarify' the points they have already made in writing.

43. On that basis, the case officer will make best endeavours to facilitate effective means for objectors to be heard in a coordinated and effective fashion. The ward councillors, a representative from the church and a representative from the local community will be contacted to discuss this approach, but this will not override the right for any party to act independently if they wish. All parties will be updated in due course as the council aims to secure good access to this meeting for all.

Case Officer Comments

- 44. It became apparent very early in the consultation period that the application gave rise to concern amongst many local residents and other members of the public with connections to the area, in particular through a local church. In many instances concerns were raised with reference to the operation of the nightclubs Gas and Chemistry that previously occupied Gibson House.
- 45. An application for a premises licence at Gibson House was refused in 2010, but a premises licence had previously been in force for a number of years. The premises has not been licensed as a venue since at least 2010.
- 46. Members are asked to consider the following points, which seem pertinent to the case:-
 - 1. Objectors raised significant concerns regarding the impact on the local community of a licensed venue at this location in the past.
 - 2. In light of those allegations, the sub committee may consider to what extent concerns raised about previous use of the premises may have been due to poor management of the venue and/ or generally lower standards in the management of the night time economy at that time. If so, how far could those concerns be addressed by better management practice in future?
 - 3. Alternatively, they may consider the extent to which it is reasonable to believe that alleged past problems may reoccur through use of the venue due to a potential conflict of the intended activities and the nature of the area concerned. The specific details of this application and management controls proposed for the venue are crucial considerations in this respect.
 - 4. Many objectors have grave concerns about the proximity of a licensed venue to a church, but it must be acknowledged by all parties that moral issues cannot be considered in their own right. However, concerns raised in that regard that do relate to the promotion of the licensing objectives and this application certainly can be considered.
 - 5. It is understood the management team for the proposed venue will be different than has previously operated the venue.
 - 6. The sub-committee may wish to satisfy itself whether the prospective licence holder has policies and procedures in place to address the concerns raised by the objectors.
 - 7. It should be noted that an existing licensed premises is generally open until a later terminal hour on a daily basis in close proximity to this proposed venue namely 'The Bottle of Sauce'. That premises is permitted to sell alcohol from 10:00 00:00 hours on Sunday Thursday and 10:00 01:00 hours on Friday and Saturday, and seems to coexist well with the local community and does not apparently give rise to a disproportionate number of complaints.
 - 8. The operation of licensed venues in the night time economy seems generally more developed and improved since the previous venue closed. For example, the setting up

of Night Safe (launched in 2007) and the work done by stakeholders to achieve and maintain the Purple Flag status for the town (first awarded 2016) suggests a more effective partnership based approach to tackling alcohol related problems now exists.

- 47. Furthermore, all parties must recognize the following important considerations:-
- The decision making exercise is considered as an 'administrative' process in legal terms. However, there is potential for legal challenge against a decision, and where a party appeals, the decision making process is scrutinized. The licensing authority is bound by legislation and case law in how it carries out this function, and so must act accordingly.
- Members can <u>only</u> consider evidence/ reasoning presented, which is clearly related to the promotion of the licensing objectives <u>and</u> this specific proposal.
- The fact that no responsible authority objected to the proposal must be considered by the sub

 committee. Where those bodies have concerns about an application, they can object and recommend conditions. They are considered as technical experts in their fields and have not objected, which confirms they are satisfied with the applicant's proposals.
 - 48. Finally, the case *R* (Hope and Glory Public House Limited) v City of Westminster Magistrates' Court [2011] EWCA Civ 31 is considered an important licensing case that was consider by the Court of Appeal in 2011. An extract from the conclusion provides some assistance for the sub committee:-
 - 41. As Mr Matthias rightly submitted, the licensing function of a licensing authority is an administrative function. By contrast, the function of the district judge is a judicial function. The licensing authority has a duty, in accordance with the rule of law, to behave fairly in the decision-making procedure, but the decision itself is not a judicial or quasi-judicial act. It is the exercise of a power delegated by the people as a whole to decide what the public interest requires. (See the judgment of Lord Hoffmann in Alconbury at para 74.)
 - 42. Licensing decisions often involve weighing a variety of competing considerations: the demand for licensed establishments, the economic benefit to the proprietor and to the locality by drawing in visitors and stimulating the demand, the effect on law and order, the impact on the lives of those who live and work in the vicinity, and so on. Sometimes a licensing decision may involve narrower questions, such as whether noise, noxious smells or litter coming from premises amount to a public nuisance. Although such questions are in a sense questions of fact, they are not questions of the "heads or tails" variety. They involve an evaluation of what is to be regarded as reasonably acceptable in the particular location. In any case, deciding what (if any) conditions should be attached to a licence as necessary and proportionate to the promotion of the statutory licensing objectives is essentially a matter of judgment rather than a matter of pure fact.
 - 43. The statutory duty of the licensing authority to give reasons for its decision serves a number of purposes. It informs the public, who can make their views known to their elected representatives if they do not like the licensing sub-committee's approach. It enables a party aggrieved by the decision to know why it has lost and to consider the prospects of a successful appeal. If an appeal is brought, it enables the magistrates' court to know the reasons which led to the decision. The fuller and clearer the reasons, the more force they are likely to carry.

49. The last paragraph highlights in particular the statutory duty of the sub – committee to give clear written reasons for its decision. This allows all parties to an application to understand the eventual outcome in a meaningful way.

DECISION MAKING

- 50. The sub committee will consider thoroughly and diligently the representations and their relevance to the determination of this application. Members must limit their considerations of the objections to where they are specifically relevant to the application before them.
- 51. The licensing authority must determine the application and decide whether to:-
- Grant the application with mandatory conditions and those offered in the application only, or
- Grant the application with mandatory conditions, those conditions offered in the application (amended or otherwise) and attach specific conditions to promote the licensing objectives - where it considers it appropriate. (This may include restricting the hours applied for in the application), or
- Refuse the application, as it considers it appropriate to promote the licensing objectives.
- 52. Each application must be considered on its own merits and in accordance with the 2003 Act, the Guidance and the licensing authority's Statement of Licensing Policy.
- 53. If conditions are attached to the grant of a licence they must be tailored to the individual type, location and characteristics of the premises/ events concerned. This is essential to avoid the imposition of disproportionate and overly burdensome conditions on premises where there is no need for such conditions.
- 54. If any party to a hearing is aggrieved by the decision of the licensing authority (this means the applicant or any person/ organisation/ business that made a relevant representation), they may appeal to the Magistrates' Court. They must do so within 21 days of being notified of the decision in writing.

Licence conditions – general principles

55. Conditions on a premises licence are important in setting the parameters within which premises can lawfully operate. The use of wording such as 'must', 'shall' and to a lesser extent 'will' is encouraged.

56. Licence conditions:-

- Must be appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives;
- Must be precise and enforceable;
- Must be unambiguous and clear in what they intend to achieve;
- Should not duplicate other statutory requirements or other duties or responsibilities placed on the employer by other legislation;
- Must be tailored to the individual type, location and characteristics of the premises and events concerned;
- Should not be standardised and may be unlawful when it cannot be demonstrated that they
 are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives in an individual case;

- Should not replicate offences set out in the 2003 Act or other legislation;
- Should be proportionate, justifiable and be capable of being met, (for example, whilst beer glasses may be available in toughened glass, wine glasses may not);
- Cannot seek to manage the behaviour of customers once they are beyond the direct management of the licence holder and their staff, but may impact on the behaviour of customers in the immediate vicinity of the premises or as they enter or leave; and

• Should be written in a prescriptive format.





I write to object to the planning application above which is relevant to Gibson House, St James Square.

Reasons for objection

The Prevention of Public Nuisance

This is largely residential area which also houses the Catholic Church, St Gregory's and the Catholic Primary School St Gregory's. The access to the primary school is directly past the building.

The proposal indicates that on many occasions the club will be allowed to open until 2p.m. in the morning. This includes Christmas Eve when Catholics celebrate the birth of Christ with Midnight Mass. A night club opposite opening until 2 p.m. would directly interfere with this spiritual occasion. The opening hours are also likely to interfere with other services. The likely noise in the evenings and comings and goings of rowdy crowds is also likely to be very disruptive for the people living in the local flats.

The protection of children from harm

Despite the efforts of the police such places are hotbeds for the distribution of drugs amongst the attendees. When it was there before needles and other drug paraphernalia were found on the access to the school which does not present a healthy image to primary school children. The noise from the very load music was also disruptive and this was often to be heard in normal school hours.

As Cheltenham still has a housing shortage conversion into affordable housing which would be in keeping with the residential area might be more appropriate.

We are writing on our client's behalf to formally object to the Application for a new Premises Licence in respect of the Property.

1 INTERESTED PARTY

We confirm that Genie Toys Plc is an interested party, entitled to make representations in respect of the Application.

Our client owns and occupies commercial office premises at Genie House, 20 St James Square, Cheltenham ("Genie House") for the purposes of its business of the design and development of toys and games.

Our client's property at Genie House directly abuts the Property.

2 NEW PREMISES LICENCE APPLICATION

We have kindly been provided with a copy of the Application submitted by the Applicant by the Council's licencing team on 10 March 2020.

There were no plans attached to the Application.

We are unsure as to whether that is because the Applicant has yet to submit plans to the Council.

In the circumstances, we must reserve our client's position to make further and supplemental representations once plans have been provided, and when our client is fully able to appreciate the scale and nature of the proposed operation of the business for which the Applicant seeks authorisation pursuant to the Application.

3 PREVIOUS NEW PREMISES LICENCE APPLICATION – SEPTEMBER 2010

Our client is aware of and made representations in respect of the previous new premises licence application made in September 2010. That application also related to the former Chemistry nightclub premises at Gibson House and was submitted by Headland Entertainments Limited.

Our client was represented at the licencing sub-committee hearing that took place on 11 November 2010, and when that new premises licence application was refused.

The applicant's appeal of that decision to refuse the grant of a new premises application was subsequently withdrawn by the applicant in June 2011.

We submit that this is relevant, as many (if not all) of the concerns and representations made in respect of that new premises licence application seem to us to similarly apply to the Application now made.

Further, the licensing sub-committee's grounds for refusing the previous application included:

- There was insufficient detail as to the numbers of customers likely to be leaving the premises at closing time.
- There was no dispersal policy in place.
- There were no proper plans for a smoking shelter and the proposal made at the hearing would exacerbate the problems outside the premises.

4 THE CURRENT APPLICATION

In light of the above, we suggest it is surprising that (based upon the information we have been provided with to date) the Application does not address the above concerns.

By way of example, and we address this further below, the provisions proposed for the prevention of public nuisance simply suggest that there will be an outside smoking area, managed by door supervisors, and to be used at any one time by no more than 10% of the overall capacity of the Property. It is unclear to us where this apparent outside smoking area is to be.

It is also unclear from the application we have seen as to the proposed capacity of the Property.

If there is further information in the Council's possession which covers such points, then we should be grateful if it could be provided to us please as a matter of urgency, and a further period allowed for representations on behalf of our client to be supplemented.

Turning specifically to the Licencing Objectives, we set out our client's representations below:

(a) The prevention of crime and disorder

Our client is very concerned as to the impact the granting of a premises licence will have on Genie House.

As explained above, our client occupies commercial office premises at Genie House, St James Square, Cheltenham, which it occupies the purposes of its business of the design and development of toys and games.

Our client is also the registered freehold owner (Land Registry title no. GR340288) of Genie House.

Genie House directly abuts the Property, and is separated only by a party wall.



Genie House also extends to the rear and abuts the outside area to the rear of Gibson House.

Given the close proximity of Genie House to the Property, our client is concerned as to the real risk of damage being caused to its property by persons attending the Property.

Further, and prior to the previous nightclub's closure in 2005, our client is aware of the regular need for the involvement of Police Officers to work with door staff because of complaints from neighbours arising from those attending and leaving the Property.

The application does little to address such concerns.

Whist it is stated that there will be a CCTV system, consisting of a minimum of eight cameras installed at the Property, no information is given as to where such cameras will be installed, whether they will be inside or outside the Property, and whether any CCTV cameras will be placed in such a position as to act as a deterrent to prevent crime and disorder affecting Genie House.

With regard to the Council's Licencing Policy Statement, whilst it is acknowledged that the Property is not within the Designated Area of Concern, our client notes that it is in fact immediately adjacent to that area, being on the corner of St James Square and Knapp Road/Clarence Street. It is submitted that the fact that the Property is immediately adjacent to the Designated Area of Concern should be a factor to which the licencing sub-committee has regard.

(b) The prevention of public nuisance

Our client is extremely concerned at the impact the proposed use of the Property would have upon Genie House and the operation of its business.

The exact nature of the proposed licensable activities proposed is unclear, but the fact that an application has been made to install a sign "St James' Club" suggests use including a nightclub.

In particular, our client is concerned about noise nuisance and the adverse impact on the environmental quality and character of the area.

As stated above, Genie House immediately abuts the Property and is divided only by a party wall.

The Application includes inter alia:

- The playing of live music from 10am to 12 Midnight (10pm on Sundays);
- The exhibition of films from 10am to 12 Midnight (10pm on Sundays);
- The playing of recorded music from 10am to 12 Midnight (10pm on Sundays);
- The performance of dance from 10am to 12 Midnight (10pm on Sundays);
- The supply of alcohol from 10am to 12 Midnight (10pm on Sundays).

The Application accordingly seeks permission for the carrying out of such licensable activities for 14 hours per day on six days of the week and 12 hours a day on Sundays. It is submitted this is excessive in the extreme.



Further, the Application seeks to extend the operating hours for all licensable activities by two hours on all days on which races are held at Cheltenham Racecourse.

On the basis of our investigations, such additional provision of hours would apply on some 16 days per year.

Given the age and nature of the Property, our client is concerned that there is no, or no adequate sound insulation that will prevent disturbance to our client and its employees whilst it is conducting its business at Genie House.

Our client is also concerned as to noise, nuisance and disruption caused inter alia by persons smoking outside the Property (given of course the smoking ban which prevents smoking from within premises). As stated above, it is unclear to us what provision is to be made for smoking areas outside of the Property, but by looking at the footprint and layout of the Property itself, it would seem the only viable positioning for such areas will be to the rear of the Property, and which is immediately adjacent to and at the rear of Genie House.

The mere statement that the "outside smoking area will be effectively managed" within the Application is totally inadequate.

Further, it is unclear as to how many persons may be using such areas (wherever they may be) at any one time – our client cannot understand the proposal for no more than 10% of the overall capacity at the time, without understanding what it is proposed the total overall capacity of the Property is to be.

Further, simply suggesting the erection of signage is inadequate.

In addition to the failure to specify the proposed designated smoking areas, there appears no reference to the provision of a smoking shelter for use during inclement weather. This is particularly surprising given the reasons for refusal of the previous new premises application.

Further, the impact and disruption caused by the Property being operated for 14 hours a day for 6 days a week and 12 hours a day on Sundays will be substantial (by way of example, round the clock deliveries and refuse collection), particularly in an area with little or no on street parking. Our client is particularly concerned here that its two parking spaces at the rear of Genie House/the Property will be used for unlawful parking by persons operating/attending the Property, and/or access obstructed.

No provision is made within the Application for addressing such concerns.

On the basis of the information provided, our client therefore considers it is inevitable that significant noise nuisance will be caused to our client, and as a result, this will adversely impact upon our client's business.

In addition, our client is concerned as to (the fairly to be expected) drunken behaviour (such as vomiting and urinating in the streets and on Genie House), and rubbish being left in the vicinity of Genie House/the Property. All of this will affect the amenity of the area, and more specifically, adversely impact upon our client's business and those customers and contacts visiting Genie House.

With reference to the Licencing Policy Statement of Cheltenham Borough Council, it is notable that the Applicant has substantially failed to comply with the requirements of paragraph 3.22.. The Application has also inter alia failed to address the requirements of paragraph 3.27.

The Applicant further has failed to make provision for the sufficient measures referred to by paragraph 3.28 of the Licencing Policy Statement.

(c) The prevention of children from harm

Our client is in the business of the design and development of toys and games principally for children.

Further, our client notes there is a primary school, church (St Gregorys) and day nursery immediately in the immediate vicinity of the Property, and which will be in use for a significant proportion of the proposed hours for licensable activities at the Property.

It is accordingly suggested the Property is an inappropriate location for the operation of the licensable activities sought and for such periods as proposed within the Application itself.

5 CONCLUSION

Given the nature of the area in which the Property is situated, the lack of consideration given to the four Licencing Objectives within the Application, and for the reasons stated above, our client opposes the grant of the new premises licence sought and submits the Application is inappropriate and should be refused in its entirety.

In this regard, our client also urges the licencing sub-committee to have regard to the issues and problems experienced before Chemistry at the Property closed in 2005.

Our client would also urge the Licensing Sub-Committee to have regard to the changes in the character of the area in the last fifteen years, with new office and residential blocks resulting in a quieter and much improved area to that before the nightclub closure in 2005.

We should be grateful if you could acknowledge receipt of this letter.

We also would take the opportunity to notify you that it is our client's intention to be represented at the licencing sub-committee hearing.

To whom it may concern,

I am emailing regarding the consultation taking place for reference 20/00454/PRMA Chemistry Night Club on behalf of Elephant Moon Day Nursery which is located a few doors away from the Chemistry premises on St James Square.

The children's day nursery is registered for children aged between 3 month and 5 years old and open from 7.30am to 6.30pm. Parents can drop off their children and collect them at any time during these hours. The nursery is also located next to The Catholic Primary and Nursery School of Saint Gregory the Great — who operate similar hours through the school and clubs.

This licensing application gives the nursery many areas of concern as listed below:

- Location Cheltenham has changed dramatically in the last 10 years, with this area being solely based on Education, Residential, The Church and Offices. There are restaurants located on the other side of St James Square as well as on St Georges Place but these can be seen as an extension of the Town Centre and have no impact on our usage. There is also a Pub with offices above located on Clarence Street but again this is really an extension of the Town Centre and does not impact our area.
- Opening Hours The suggested opening hours on the licensing form is from 10am 12am. This is in conflict with our parents dropping children at the nursery as well as collecting them. Many of our parents use push chairs to transport the children to/from the setting, which would involve passing the Chemistry Club and unfortunately we would be concerned about passing "Club Goers" and the impact this would have on children/parents.
- Smoking Area There isn't a specific smoking area listed on the application so I would assume this would be at the front of the property at the top of St James Square. Again, we can only see a negative impact being made on Children/Parents having to pass a group of smokers on the pavement and the intimidation this would cause.
- Nuisance Undoubtedly, there will be a nuisance element of "Club Goers" at the premises. Whilst I understand there will CCTV and Safety Logs present, I do not feel this is the correct environment to place a Licensed property, particularly as it is located 3 doors away from a Children's Day Nursery and a Primary School. There is an ally way between the School and the Nursery which links Knapp Rd to St James Square which is hidden from public view and an area which could be exploited by this nuisance element of club goers by way of litter, urinating, vomiting etc all of which should be prohibited in an area which is widely used by children.
- Past History whilst I am not familiar with the Chemistry club, I have been told that the premises did bring a negative impact on the area whilst it was open, in particular finding syringes and condoms around the area, as well as lots of late night noise and a police presence.

As a Parishioner of St Gregory's Church, Cheltenham I was very concerned to hear about the application for a New Premises License by the nightclub Chemistry at Gibson House, St James Square.

My representation includes the following concerns:

- 1. The church and school of St Gregory will be at risk of drunk and disorderly members of the public with an increased risk of crime and vandalism.
- 2. The extension of hours on special occasions will put Parishioners at risk when attending Mass, for example Midnight Mass on Christmas Eve. This will result in some Parishioners, particularly children and the elderly, not feeling or being safe when arriving at or leaving church.
- 3. When this premises was a nightclub previously there was a lot of harmful rubbish and drug paraphernalia left in the area which effected the church, the school and the local residents. As a teacher myself I am increasingly concerned about the safety of the children attending the school or coming to mass and feel that if Chemistry opened as a nightclub children would not be protected from harm and would be at risk.

I hope that you will take my representation into account as well as the risks to the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety and the protection of children when considering the application for a New Premises Licence.






Dear Sirs,

As a devout Catholic and one who regularly attends the Church of St Gregory the Great for for services, worship and prayers, I wish to put my views forth regarding the licensing of a night club right across the entrance of the Church.

- •On an average, 800 followers regularly attend Sunday services at the church, with well-over a thousand attending services on Easter, Christmas and during lent season. In fact, on the Sunday of 13.03.2020, despite the hue and cry about the Corona Virus, there were no less than 200 attendees for the 09:30 service. I was very surprised myself to see such a large number of people come to church. Such is the faith of the people.
- •Being a place of worship and meditation, my view of having a night club right opposite the Church seems like a very offensive idea especially with today's youth having absolutely no regard and respect for people's privacy and property. I shudder to imagine the din and commotion that would take place around the club as we have Easter, Christmas and normal services going on in our Church.
- •It has not been unusual for me to see people lie fallen and asleep in front of pubs and on the roadside from being highly sozzled. If this should happen in front of this club, I fear to imagine what impression young children attending the School just a few metres away might have. I don't think that it would be very pleasant for young children to see such situations just before...or even after they finish their day at school.
- •As of now, the environs around the Church is pretty well maintained, with hardly any untoward incidents. It is very unlikely it will remain the same should a night club open up where it plans to open up.
- •I do see a few children walk unaccompanied to school either from their homes, the bus stop or from the Waitrose parking. This being the case there is always a probability of a child being abused or outraged.
- •As of now, there is very limited parking for Church attendees when they come for services. Having a nightclub bang opposite the Church could only invite illegal parking, causing chaos, conflicts and accidents.

Considering all the above, I think that having a night Club at the premises opposite the Church and in the very vicinity of a primary school is a very bad idea, and by no means should be allowed.

I hope you will consider my views and take a decision accordingly.

We wish to make representation that this licence should NOT be granted for the following reasons:

- 1) Proximity to local primary schools in a previous iteration of a club at these premises, **considerable risk of harm** was posed to children attending local schools, primarily from the club members discarding drug paraphernalia, also vomit, broken glass and other detritus some of which was distressing for young people to have to see on their way to school. Our own children are now much older and no longer attending that school: it did concern us greatly at the time on their behalf and does so now in relation to the many young parents we know have Children in St Gregory the Great Primary school now.
- 2) General Public Safety: we have personally had to deal with **drunk and disorderly** people leaving the previous club and entering St Gregory the Great Church while services were taking place. Some of these people were very aggressive and **caused distress to members of the congregation**. We anticipate similar issues arising should the club open again. The church grounds (St James Square) and School Doorways (Knapp Road) were frequently used as dumping grounds for drug equipment (needles) discarded contraceptives and the like which all pose a very real hazard to public health, besides being most unpleasant to have to be delt with.
- 3) Thee is no particular reason to imagine that this Club would in future be any less prone to the criminal and **public nuisance** activity that takes place in and around 'night clubs' and although we do not have access to data, we hope that the licensing decision will take into account crime statistics for this area back when the club was previously open. Our experiences indicate that crime and nuisance in and around St James Square has greatly diminished since the club closed down. And since then, a considerable increase in residential development has taken place and we worry that local residents will be adversely affected by late evening noise, and difficulty accessing their parking areas / doorways.

Thank you for considering our objections. We make them as members of the congregation at St Gregory the Great Catholic Church. We are also responsible there for several aspects of youth work, and we support work with elderly parishioners - these groups of people will in our opinion all be greatly and adversely affected by the granting of this licence.



I am writing to voice my concern regarding the above application.

My name is and I live in 17 St James North, Cheltenham (approximately 50m from Gibson House) where I own a 1 bedroom flat in a quiet block. I have lived for approximately five and a half years and really love this location. One of the reasons that I chose this area was specifically its proximity to town with almost no through foot or car traffic.

I believe that approval of this application will be a net negative for the St James area community.

Primarily, the proposed site for the premises (shown in black) is exceedingly close to both *Elephant Moon Day Nursery* and *The Catholic Primary and Nursery School of Saint Gregory the Great* (shown in red). The proposed opening hours (10am until Midnight) significantly overlap the schools opening hours and collection times. The school is often still releasing students well after the allocated closing time (approx. 15:00) as parents become available to collect. Thus, it seems to me irresponsible open an alcohol serving music venue because:

- 1) Music and sounds from the venue will interfere with children's education during the day
- 2) The possibility of intoxicated individuals interacting negatively with the children or parents of these schools

Secondly, the area surrounding the proposed venue is mostly either:

As a Council you have encouraged residential growth in this area and now you are proposing to put a night club on our doorstep with all the anti social disturbance that will bring. The stories from residents who remember this venue as a nightclub from years ago have horror stories to tell of drunken behaviour, drug abuse, fornication in peoples gardens and disturbances well into the early hours of the morning.

We are a quiet and civilised neighbour with a nice mix of residential property and offices. An area that has been improving steadily in the last 5 years. The evenings and weekends here are quiet and peaceful. This will all change with a constant stream of rowdy nightclubbers moving to and from the public car park and Gibson House past our building of 10 flats.

 - b. The Premises is at the entrance to that cul de sac. It is unavoidable that small children and parents with children in strollers will pass the Premises frequently.
 - c. Any broken glass originating from the Premises (whether emanating from the smoking area or people taking drinks outside of Premises) will find its way onto the pavement and can cause a danger to children.
 - d. Although it falls short of a danger, the children going to school and nursery should also not be unnecessarily subjected to passing vomit, urine, blood, and cigarette butts on their way to school. It is simply inappropriate.
- 2. Drunk people in the area of children's facilities.
 - a. I have worked as a bartender for a number of years and am fully aware how easy it is for drunk customers to steal or cause damage to the local area, for no apparent reason (having responded to a broken window from this year's race week only in the last few days). I simply cannot fathom why anyone would think it would be sensible to place a nightclub around 30 to 60 metres away from a primary school or children's nursery with that ever present risk.

Next Steps

For the above-reasons I object to the Application and the granting of a licence for a nightclub on St James Square.

I do not believe that the imposition of conditions will satisfactorily address my concerns.

Please let me know if and when the Application is listed for a hearing, as I would wish to attend.

Where would the smoking area be?

If it is at the front, it would be coming in through our windows, If it is at the back, there are 4 properties at the rear as well as our own, whereby the smoke would blow in through the windows. It is bad enough if there is one smoker, how bad would it be if there were potentially more than 30 people smoking at any one time?

- a. The main entrances to St Gregory's Primary School and Elephant Moon Children's Nursery is by way of a cul de sac on St James Square. The route from St Gregory's School to St Gregory's Church (which the kids take every week) is also along the same road.
- b. The Premises is at the entrance to that cul de sac. It is unavoidable that small children and parents with children in strollers will pass the Premises frequently.
- c. Any broken glass originating from the Premises (whether emanating from the smoking area or people taking drinks outside of Premises) will find its way onto the pavement and can cause a danger to children.
- d. Although it falls short of a danger, the children going to school and nursery should also not be unnecessarily subjected to passing vomit, urine, blood, and cigarette butts on their way to school. It is simply inappropriate.
- 2. Drunk people in the area of children's facilities.

We simply cannot fathom why anyone would think it would be sensible to place a nightclub around 30 to 60 metres away from a primary school or children's nursery with all of the ever present risks.

Next Steps

For the above-reasons I object to the Application and the granting of a licence for a nightclub on St James Square.

I do not believe that the imposition of conditions will satisfactorily address our concerns. Please let us know if and when the Application is listed for a hearing, as we would wish to attend and speak.

I am a parishioner of St. Gregory's Parish and our Church is directly opposite the premises in question. We have daily services and masses in the church itself and meetings in the adjacent rooms "The Old Priory" We already have one licenced premises near the church and there is no need for another. The noise from such an establishment would cause a public nuisance as we attend our services throughout the year. We have daily masses, Holydays of Obligation, Vigil Masses, Penitential Services, Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament and many more.

We are currently in Lent and Holy Week will soon be upon us when there will be events all week, at different times, but mostly in the evening and culminating with the Easter Vigil from late on Holy Saturday Evening through to Midnight Mass ending on Easter Sunday morning.

This is the highlight of the Liturgical Year as we celebrate the Lord rising from the dead on Easter Sunday morning. We do not wish this and other services to be interrupted by traffic, noise and loud music and then to meet some of the participants, often the worse for alcoholic drink, on our way out of church.

There is a low wall around St. Gregory's property and although the gates are closed it is easy to climb over and use the area to relive yourself, if you have not had time to go to the "Gents" before leaving the club.

Public safety is also an issue as some of the revellers do not appreciate how drunk they are and can be abusive, cause litter with beer cans and particularly

glass bottles which can easily break. As stated above it is also a matter of Public safety if many older parishioners meet these people on their way home.

There is also the potential nuisance and danger from other rubbish to be disposed off e.g. needles and condoms.

St Gregory's Catholic Primary School is around the corner from the club at the end of a cul- de –sac and this would be an ideal place for drug taking and disposing of old beer bottles or needles. If such items were picked up by 4-11 year old children then surely this is not Protecting Children from harm.

As a former Headteacher in Gloucester I am only too aware of what can be thrown into the school playground. You can get the caretaker to do their rounds but not every needle or condom can be spotted until it is too late or a parent comes in to inform you. This puts not only the pupils but the parents and staff at risk.

For these reasons, I strongly request that you refuse this application.

I wholeheartedly do not condone the New Premises Licence being granted for the following reasons.

Firstly the noise and antisocial behaviour would lead to crime and disorder within the community. Bearing in mind that St Gregory the Great has been providing services for the catholic population since 1858, it would be totally disrespectful.

Public safety is another issue which must be considered. The amount of litter, most of which will be dangerous, is of deep concern to me. It is inevitable that bottles, cans, litter and unfortunately clinical waste will no doubt be abandoned on or nearby church property. This is much more than undesirable. It is indeed highly dangerous and harmful.

Whilst St Gregory's offers parishioners services all year round, there are many evening and late evening Masses which would coincide with licensing hours. This is not in tune with prayer and meditation in church. Also there are meetings throughout the year in the Old Priory. Again the licensing hours would create a nuisance to the public

Finally St Gregory's Catholic Primary School is close by. The children come over to church frequently through the academic year. The children are aged between 4 and 11 years. If the licence was granted, I could not see how these pupils could possibly remain protected from harm.

I therefore do not support the application for a New Premises Licence and my wish is that it should be revoked.



I am writing to you to strongly object to the proposed licence for the above Chemistry premises.

I have lived in Cheltenham since 1996 and well remember the previous nightclubs in this location. Public nuisance was a regular event at weekends, with my friends who lived in flats nearby routinely disturbed at 2am. (The impact on people in the surrounding residential area is now exacerbated by the many new flats built close by) My wife has also had the dubious pleasure of having to reprimand a pair of men who had just left the nightclub one evening who were urinating on the doors of the neighbouring church.

I would also like to object on the grounds of prote Page 113 from harm. During the days of the previous nightclub, I lost count of the number of glasses and glass bottles scattered around the streets by people arriving at or leaving the club. In many cases, these glasses and glass bottles were broken and no effort had been made to clear them up by club-goers or the club. With a school and two nurseries yards from the club, the risk to the safety of children on mornings after a club is obvious.

I hope that you take notice of this objection on the above grounds. Cheltenham has many other, far better locations for clubs that do no raise the same issues. (Given the failures of the previous clubs in the proposed location, I suspect that alternative locations will also be better options in terms of commercial risk to the owners)

I am writing to lodge my protest against the above application. I have lived peacefully in St. James North 1, St James Square for 10 years now and am now a Director of the Right to Manage of the property representing all the owners of the building. I have been in this position for over 6 months and work with two other Directors and the managing agent.

We peacefully coexist with St. Gregory's Church and St. Gregory's Primary School which are in the immediate area. Resources such as parking get stretched when there are events there and I think to add another commercial enterprise such as Chemistry bringing traffic and footfall to the immediate area would undoubtedly be a frustrating impediment. Also as a resident I pay an annual parking fee for Z12 of which there are 3 to 4 spaces directly outside Chemistry which I occasionally use. I would not feel comfortable leaving my car there in the knowledge that people who had been drinking would pass directly past my car. Where I normally park is just a stone's throw away outside my building and I would not have full confidence that my car and building entrance would be safe from vandalism while there are drunk people leaving at closing or waiting for taxis.

As I said above there is a primary school in the direct area and according to the information I have received Chemistry would be open every day from 10 am. Therefore I think it to be totally inappropriate to have alcohol consumption in the extremely close proximity of primary school children. The same goes to the parishioners of the Church who may suffer harassment and abuse when they enter or leave their place of worship.

From a personal point of view I go to bed at a decent time in preparation for work every day and I find it very hard to believe that I will not be disturbed by the music playing on a daily basis. This is really a public nuisance and will affect all the residents here. Also there will be shouting and noise from drunk people leaving and entering the club on a daily basis.

Thus to conclude this is a tight knit community here with the school, church, residents, not to mention St. James House, an office place of work who will not want drunk people directly outside their place of work. There is no place for a nightclub and I really believe it will cause a public nuisance.

Thank you for your voicemail message. I'm afraid I still haven't been able to post a comment and the reason continues to be given as a system error. I attach an objection and would be obliged if you acknowledge receipt.

My details are

9 Malvern Hill House CheltenhamGL52 3JE I have had the opportunity to consider the above application for a premises licence and would be obliged if you would treat this as a formal objection to the grant of the premises licence. At the outset, I would confirm that I am a parishioner of the Roman Catholic parish of St Gregory the Great which, as you will know, is situated directly opposite the application premises.

In the past, when the club was open for business, I have, on behalf of the parish, engaged with the operators of the club to stop antisocial behaviour such as the projection of images onto the church roof and the use of radio microphones which operated in such a way that the festivities being enjoyed in the club on Christmas Eve during Midnight Mass at the church were audible through the church's own amplification system.

The proposed premises have had a number of night club manifestations and the frequent closures of the premises as trading premises suggests to me that the operation of them as licenced premises is not viable and this implies that the conditions proposed in the application might be subject to pressure of breach to enhance the commercial viability of the venture.

Considering the Licensing Objectives:

1. The prevention of crime and disorder:

This is always a thorny problem for a new venture because there is no evidence to show that the risk of crime and disorder in the vicinity of the premises is any greater than the risk surrounding other premises. However, these premises are some distance from other similar premises and the flow of patrons between these premises and other premises in the town may well give opportunities for crime and disorder in an area of the town not presently affected by the type of crime and disorder associated with late night licensed premises.

2. Public safety:

This is an issue for the statutory authorities.

3. The prevention of public nuisance:

- The application premises are situated in what is now, largely, a residential or office-based environment. "The Bottle of Sauce" public house, the nearest licensed premises to the application premises, is the present manifestation of the St James Hotel, which has been a feature of the area for a very long time. It is in the nature of licensed premises that noise emanating from the premises or the vocal high spirits of patrons will affect the amenity of local residents. If the application is successful, it is inevitable that the current level of nuisance will be increased. A notice encouraging patrons to respect the needs of neighbours is unlikely to have much, if any effect.
- The application states that a smoking area will be policed by security staff. Such an outdoor area will inevitably increase noise nuisance for local residents.
- Finally, I note that in the proposed operating schedule it is proposed that "Unless otherwise specified on this licence no licensable activities shall take place at the premises with the exception of pre-booked and/or ticketed events." This is a

meaningless proposal insofar as it relates to ticketed events unless those tickets are for purchase rather than being given out free of charge and, even then, it is meaningless unless the cost of tickets is of a sufficient sum to regulate the patronage.

4. The protection of children from harm

The Catholic School of St Gregory the Great, a primary school which caters for all ages from pre-school to year 6, is situated in very close proximity to the application premises. The application shows that proposed operating hours will be from 10.00 AM each Monday to Sunday inclusive and that operating times will continue uninterrupted until 12.00 midnight (10.00PM on Sundays). This means that children attending the school will be walking past the open premises at the end of each school day and might be affected by the access and egress of patrons whose self-control after the consumption of alcohol may be open to criticism. The proposed outdoor smoking area will inevitably expose children to the harmful effects of second-hand tobacco smoke.



(Representation under Prevention of Public Nuisance & Prevention of Crime and Disorder)

<u>Information</u>

- I live in Somerset House (flats designated for the over-60s). It is located at the end of Knapp Road, a few metres from Gibson House / Burton House. My flat faces Knapp Road and also the junction of Knapp Road and St James Square corner.
- This area is a mix of residential and office accommodation plus a church, an art gallery and a pedestrian access alley to the church's primary school. It is an area of 'quiet enjoyment' in the evening (a nearby bar "Bottle of Sauce" respects the ambience of the locale and now complies with limits and noise-reduction strategies regarding late-night music events).

I am extremely concerned that the re-emergence of activities within Gibson House will destroy the local environment because the behaviour of patrons 'technically' able to drink there for 14+/16+ hours will inevitably impact on the surrounding area once they leave the premises. Patrons' behaviour was uncontrollable when Chemistry was open previously. I fear it will be again.

Somerset House had a live-in warden and husband at that time and it was possible to shut our front gates. This is not the situation now: the gates cannot be closed, there is no management presence at night, cars are parked at the front of the building — and also in the area at the rear of the building. Three of our properties have ground floor front doors, or an access door, directly into their homes.


We now have no protection and no way of stopping club-patrons should they wish to trespass on our property, press the door-entry buttons 'for fun' or (once again) use the areas of our private gardens and car parks as toilets and/or for other antisocial behaviour including throwing-up or indulging in sexual or drug-related activities. I see no way this intrusion could be prevented.

A previous application for using the ground floor and basement areas suggested an occupancy of 110 persons for the Ground Floor restaurant and 210 for the basement 'function room'. I am assuming this will be the minimum of persons occupying the premises should the current Licence Application be granted. This is unacceptable, particularly in view of the long opening hours.

The cars of elderly residents (parked out of sight at the rear of our property) were previously been vandalised when the nightclub was a 'going concern'. That has not happened since it closed down.

The Licensing Application seems 'light' on the control of behaviour. How do a couple of door staff effectively ensure there are only 10% of the club's attendees on the small external smoking area? And having CCTV cameras installed is no deterrent to behaviour outside the premises.

Our police service is already stretched to its limit. We are unlikely to be able to elicit a swift response if (no, that should be "when") trouble arises if a licence is granted and 'St James Club' opens within Gibson House and Burton House.

I note that Burton House has been included in the above Application, in addition to Ground Floor and Basement areas in Gibson House.

In 2012, there was a <u>Planning Application</u> (12/01809/LBC) submitted for the use of the same areas, and for the same purposes as suggested in the current <u>Licensing Application</u>.

At that time it was understood that deliveries for the Ground Floor restaurant would be made to the rear entrance of the premises. This is a very narrow alley in Knapp Road, immediately adjacent to Burton House – and extremely close to the corner of Knapp Road and the mini-roundabout.

It is important to note this is a "blind corner" for drivers travelling north up St James's Square and turning west onto Knapp Road. It is a junction where unwary, elderly and young pedestrians are at significant risk.

- This narrow alley is not suitable for a large delivery van to enter. It would be extremely inadvisable for a lorry or delivery truck to park immediately outside the alley's entrance: there are double yellow lines on both sides of Knapp Road in this area and there would be danger of accident.
- There is no 'legal' casual parking nearly: it is all double yellow lines. (There is a three-car designated SJ street parking zone outside Somerset House).
- The eastern end of Knapp Road already has high usage with parents dropping off/collecting young children who attend St Gregory's Catholic Primary School. Unfortunately, many parents do not appear to take due note of the double yellow lines and parking restrictions and they park regardless: there would be a significantly increased risk to pedestrians and vehicle occupants if delivery vans and lorries regularly needed to access/deliver to Gibson House either via this alley, or from kerbside parking, especially at the times parents drop-off or collect school children.

As a resident of St James North 1, St James Square I am concerned that a night club on the corner of our street will completely change the dynamic of the area. I am very concerned about the level of noise we will experience with a nightclub a stone's throw away and also the general disruption and public nuisance it will cause. I can only imagine a number of customers of the venue will make their way down the street causing noise late into the night right outside our window disturbing sleep and general enjoyment of living in the area whilst also baring a risk to public safety of those walking home at night. The likelyhood of crimes and disorder is highly increased by opening this night club as it is situated in a quiet residental area hidden out of sight encouraging behaviour such as public urination and sex in public places. If there was a night club on the corner of the street before I purchased the property I would not have chosen to live here and am concerned about the harm it will have on property prices in the area. As I said, I believe it will change the area entirely. In our block of 24 flats alone these are homes of new parents, the elderly and professionals as well as plenty of other residential buildings all of which I imagine expected to have chosen homes in a quiet area that it would no longer be if this goes through.

I don't see how the area would benefit at all from having a night club. There's a primary school, a church, a nursery and an art gallery all in very close proximity to the potential club and the area is considered to be a quiet part of town to live in. This raises the concern of protecting children from harm as intoxicated customers will be in very close proximity to a school. A number of night clubs in Cheltenham have also closed not very long ago due to lack of demand, I don't see how one opening outside of the main area of town will benefit the town.

I wish to make an objection to the premises licence "Reference: 20/00454/PRMA. New Premises Licence: St James Club Ltd t/a Chemistry" for the reasons stated above, I can only see this causing public nuisance and a threat to public safety in the area.

I would like to object to the granting of a new alcohol and entertainment licence for the premises at Gibson House, St James Square aiming to trade as Chemistry.

My objections fall into 4 categories:

- Prevention of Crime and Disorder unless the nightclub owners or indeed the P&CC are able to fund additional earmarked resources, then the granting of this licence will spread the very thin town centre overnight policing across a much broader area. The hours requested are particularly long and the broadening of the Cheltenham geographical nightclub scene this far west will simply add considerable numbers of incidents to the existing worryingly high levels of crime from our night time economy. I think it very likely that the impact on crime and disorder in Cheltenham will be much wider than on the relatively quiet area of the requested licence. I am however particularly unhappy with the impact on the immediate location of this inappropriate license request.
- Public Safety the location is away from the town centre and is currently much quieter at night than the main clubbing areas. It is frightening and risky to non club goers to encounter screaming and brawling customers in the street, and the hours requested overlap with some sacred and community enhancing activities. Local Authorities have a statutory duty to build stable communities and a successful application would do the opposite.
- Prevention of Public Nuisance the noise from the previous nightclub was untenable in a semi residential area. The inevitable drunken and loud behaviour is really not appropriate in this location next to a beautiful church and near homes. Litter much of it dangerous glass, needles and vomit will once again represent a substantial public nuisance. St Gregory's Church is probably the most beautiful building in our town, and a source of great pride to Cheltonians. Why on earth would we threaten its amenity, tranquility and community enhancement by licensing a night club in a nearby listed building with single glazed windows?
- Protection of Children from Harm The proposal puts all the above risks on the doorstep of a primary school. Our young people need to be protected from the consequences of bad behaviour, and encouraged to walk to school and feel safe on their journeys. Having to pick their way once again through discarded needles, used condoms, tossed bottles, vomit and drunks is not what we want for our youngsters.

I am a Parishioner of St Gregory Page 172: atholic Church, which is situated directly opposite the proposed premises of Chemistry. I wish to object to the licensing of Chemistry for the following reasons:

- I am extremely concerned about the granting of a drinking licence directly opposite the main gates to St Gregory. We have Mass on weekdays and Saturday's between 9.30am and 10am, Sunday Masses at 8am, 9.30am (Family Mass), 11.15am and 6pm. These are very well attended. We also have a large number of Funerals & Funeral Masses during weekdays, as well as Weddings and Baptisms. In the Old Priory adjacent to the Church we have numerous activities, day and night. There is a real likelihood that these could be disrupted by noise and nuisance from Chemistry and the people who will use it. It is hardly conducive for a Funeral cortège to arrive opposite an all day club.
- I understand that Chemistry might also seek an extension to their licence for special occasions such as Christmas Eve. This could cause significant nuisance to St Gregory's and could lead to issues of Public safety as revellers mix with worshippers. St Gregory's Midnight Mass 2019 was packed with some 300-400 congregants. Earlier on Christmas Eve we have a hugely popular Children's Mass as well.
- Chemistry, as I understand it, would be serving alcohol from early morning close to St Gregory's Junior School and the Elephant Moon Day Nursery. There is considerable traffic in the area around 8.30am and when the School day finishes. The children from St Gregory's School attend Mass at the beginning and end of School Terms and would pass the club during its opening hours. The area is already very busy and an all day club would make it busier still.
- I am also concerned by the impact of anti-social and potentially criminal behaviour from an all-day club. We already have had to cope with vandalism in an area which is seldom policed. There is often considerable debris from revellers using other pubs and clubs in town. Very recently my wife and I had to walk by four patches of vomit on the pavement along Jessop Avenue. This is not only very unhygienic, but also a terrible thing for children to see when walking to school. Sadly the fouling of local paths is an all too regular occurrence.

The whole idea of a new club, within a few metres of the Bottle of Sauce (on the corner of Clarence Street), seems ridiculous. Far better to use the premises for housing, sorely needed in Cheltenham.

As a resident owner in the St. James North building, I wish to register my strong objection to the current licensing application for Gibson House on St. James Square. Since the nightclub previously run from this location closed down in 2005, the area has flourished into a peaceful and sought-after residential area full of high-end flats and office spaces, so that a noisy entertainment venue would certainly no longer be in keeping with the character of the Square as is is now, as a quiet residential area.

I note that a previous licensing application in 2010 was rejected on grounds of numerous concerns, including public nuisance, noise, safety concerns regarding the school and nursery, parking/ access issues and many more. As the Square has developed and new buildings been completed over the intervening decade, these issues will only have increased. Of course, as a property owner, I am equally concerned that the value of my flat would certainly decrease if an entertainment venue were to open on that corner, which my flat overlooks.

I am also extremely concerned that no consultation or communication with residents on the Square has yet taken place about the intention behind this application, or indeed about any progress in planning applications since around 2014 when the plan was to turn the building into flats. My method of receiving this news has been via a handwritten note on the noticeboard of my building, and on subsequently trawling through the council website I find that not only a licensing application but also a planning application for a sign to read "St. James Club" on the building has been recently submitted, with no communication to residents from the property owner as to the intention of these actions. This seems, at best, premature.

I would be grateful if these concerns could be logged and taken into consideration whilst considering the licensing application.





I am writing to object strongly to the application for an Alcohol License relating to an Events Venue site in the basement of Gibson House.





I am a parishioner at St Gregory's Church, St James Square and I would like to raise my objections to the proposed re-opening of the Chemistry night club on the following grounds:

1. Prevention of crime and disorder: when the club was last open, criminality linked to the club was a scourge for local residents and church goers. There is no reason to think things will be different this time around.

2. Public safety: When the club was open before, needles and other drug-taking paraphernalia littered the area after the club had been open late. This included used needles being thrown over the fences into the grounds of the adjoining childcare providers and school.

3. The prevention of public nuisance: the club will be open at the same time as church services are taking place in the church opposite. Again, there is precedent for noise and anti-social behaviour disrupting church services. I am a long-standing parishioner of St Gregory's Church and resident in Cheltenham. I can distinctly recall the very serious issues that took place when the above premises was previously used as a night club; Gas and later Chemistry nightclubs. I do not believe that theses serious issues would be any less than they previously were, but instead, I believe they will be even greater. I therefore profoundly object to this new Licence Application, based on both historical knowledge and the significant changes that have since taken place within the St James's Square neighbourhood. My reasons for objecting are as follows:

Crime & Disorder

• St Gregory's Church and surrounding premises will again be the target for crime, vandalism and disgusting desecration. Our church door was spay-painted/marked with foul language and the porch stained glass windows were twice broken/vandalised. Parishioners had to avoid stepping into pools of vomit or broken glass. Fast-food litter was constantly left on the pavements or behind the church wall and there was regularly evidence of sexual activity behind the church wall. Our assistant priest at the time (Fr Joachim) would, early Sunday mornings, have to remove discarded condoms and female underwear, before parishioners arrived for the Sunday morning Masses.

Public Safety

• The regular presence of large gatherings of noisy club revelers (many intoxicated) in this recently redeveloped residential area, will be very intimidating for local and passing people. The public will also, as previously, have to contend with the discarded litter, food, broken glass, vomit and drug related material, that was frequently in evidence when the premises was a night club.

Prevention of Public Nuisance

- Our evening church services would be severely disrupted by the sound of loud music and noisy revelers; some the worse for alcohol. Extended seasonal hours (e.g. Christmas and Easter) would again severely disrupt our parish services and those taking place in the adjoining Old Priory building.
- I can only see a return of this anti-social behaviour, should you approve the entertainment licence to be granted to another nightclub.
- CBC has approved and rightly encouraged significant residential developments within the immediate vicinity. The re-opening of the club would shatter the peace of the neighbourhood,

Protection of Children from Harm

- St Gregory's Primary School is only a short distance away from these premises. The children are constantly having to pass by these premises and they too will have to negotiate past the rubbish, broken glass and vomit. This, together with the vandalism that used to take place (and I'm sure will again) will be an appalling example for these young people to witness, at time when we are all endeavouring to accelerate the much improved care of our local neighbourhoods, towns and planet.
- Discarded drug taking material around the lanes, side streets and more secluded areas close to St Gregory's School, will again be of the utmost concern.

I therefore, for the reasons stated above, appeal to the Council to deny this Licence Application, for the sake of the community - St. Gregory's Primary School and St. Gregory's Church and all the local residents.

These representations are on behalf of myself and in support of those made by Rev. David Mills, the Parish priest and Parishioners of St Gregory's. I was a resident of 3 St James Square, Cheltenham, GL50 3PR, during the time when the application premises were open as a nightclub.

The Parish premises comprise not only the Church building itself, directly opposite the applicant's site, but also The Presbytery and Parish Office at 10, St James Square, and the Old Priory (Church Hall), Clarence Street; these latter are both respectively diagonally opposite the application premises.

The applicant site has a history of previous licensed clubs and cause for Licensing Representations, with associated planning problems, clearly showing the premises are not compatible with leisure activities.

Referring to the Licensing Objectives:

1. The prevention of crime and disorder:

- 1. Experience from the previous licensed clubs on this site show that patrons when arriving, but particularly when leaving, loiter noisily around the site, with vehicle doors opening and closing, without regard to the time or nearby existing residents.
- 2. We have experienced patrons exiting the club, crossing the road and trespassing on to Church premises to trespass and urinate within the Church premises, leaving behind a range of litter including drug related and other items, beyond the range of Security CCTV and staff.
- 3. St Gregory's' Primary School, and other adjoining premises, have experienced trespass and nuisance from previous club patrons.

2. Public safety:

This is an issue for the statutory authorities. There are concerns to be addressed by the Police and Fire authorities including their comments and advice as to

- (a) the permitted number of members and guests in the restaurant and club area, taking into account the suggested fire exits will be relevant.
- (b) Likewise, the enforceability of yellow line enforcement.

I am not confident that sufficient provision has been made by the applicant for the anticipated numbers in the separate areas within the site.

3. The prevention of public nuisance:

- 1. Twice daily during term time, the pupils of nearby St Gregory's Primary School, with and/or without parent, some with vehicles, use the adjoining road for access. From time to time at other times of the day, the pupils will also pass, going to and returning from the Church. This is an obvious serious hazard.
- 2. Certainly, pedestrian pupils and others would pass well within the effect of the smoking area, and be affected by second-hand smoke and the conduct of the patrons.



- 3. The proposed smoking area adjoins the public footpath and would be difficult to supervise from within the premises. Indeed, previously, the exterior doors at this site were alarmed and sounded when inadvertently pressed or leant against.
- 4. It is unrealistic and impracticable to envisage security staff supervising the smoking area whenever the premises are open.
- 5. There will be a repetition of the noise of car doors, opening and being carelessly closed by patrons and members on leaving the premises late at night. Indeed, some may be walking noisily to and from the St James car park and the Church premises, as already mentioned.
- 6.Depending on the opening and closing or extended hours, particularly at weekends or during Race Week, there would be a flow of patrons between the nearby licensed premises including, St Georges Vaults, The Bottle of Sauce, The Fire Station and, indeed, from the restaurants in St George's Street.
- 7. Previously, during the Easter midnight service, I have personally needed to instruct a colleague to go over the road to the predecessor of the Bottle of Sauce to request their entertainment system be adjusted, so that it did not interfere with our own. We still feel at risk at Christmas and Easter, although steps have been taken so that the problem with the Bottle of Sauce should not reoccur. However, it could easily be (as in the past) that a problem such as this will arise from the application premises.
- 8.Certainly, not only during our own use, but also regular and weekend users to whom we have let the Old Priory, both parochial and secular, including children, families, and elderly, have expressed concern and anxiety about disturbance late in the evening.
- 9. Obviously, the to and fro of patrons of the proposed club to anywhere in the vicinity would be a public nuisance, particularly if there were extended opening hours.
- 10. The proposed operating schedule proposes: "Unless otherwise specified on this licence no licensable activities shall take place at the premises with the exception of pre-booked and/or ticketed events." Within the framework of the applicant's intent this does not make sense.
- 11. Nearby residents, myself included, have complained about the significant noise of the arrival of bottles to the site, in delivery vehicles, and, even more so, the regular emptying of bins of the glass empties, about 8am-10.am or so.

4. The protection of children from harm:

I have outlined my grave concerns about the pupils of St Gregory's Primary School unavoidably passing so close to the smoking area twice a day during term time, sometimes also when attending St Gregory's church and increased traffic flow to and from the school premises. The atmosphere of smoke and alcohol and, indeed, should any of the patrons be adversely affected by alcohol, would be a significant risk or threat to passing children and, indeed, other passersby. Licensed premises should not permitted so close to a Primary School.

The applicants' site notice has not been available as required. At times, within the statutory period, it has not been visible at all. At other times it has been effectively hidden, because the door on which it was posted has been folded inwardly, whilst work was being undertaken inside the building. It has also moved from one point to another and back again. Others have told me of this difficulty

I am concerned that the applicant company will have difficulty complying with the four objectives of the Licensing Act 2003.

Regarding the above licence application, I would like to lodge an objection.

I live locally (as above), and I attend the Church of St Gregory the Great, St James Square, Cheltenham. I note that the proposed club licence for 'Chemistry' is for a premises located directly over the road from the Church.

My concern is that the very near location of the club will cause a public nuisance.

Services at the Church are held into the evenings on many occasions throughout the year and the arrival and departure of people attending the club will be a great nuisance. There will be noise (music plus raised voices), rowdiness, and occasionally intrusions into the Church itself by club-goers. If other 'club-environments' are anything to go by, we could also expect the club to be a cause of **crime and disorder**, such as an increase in vandalism to Church property and the grounds, urinating around the building and disagreements turning into fights. The life of the Church will be severely affected as the very possibility of such activity will deter many parishioners from attending, especially the elderly and the frail.

Such an entertainment facility should be located elsewhere in the town, not so close to the focal Church in Cheltenham for Catholic worshippers and a building of great historical significance – the two are entirely incompatible.

I hope the Council will take these concerns into account as to go ahead with the proposed licence would seriously and detrimentally affect the ongoing life of the Church.

I have serious objections to a license being granted to provide a facility to sell alcohol and provide entertainments at the above address and my reasons are outlined below:

1. St James Square and its surrounding roads are narrow and short roads which are already congested by cabs and taxis finding it a convenient place as a mini depot/hob to pick up customers from nearby locations. parents flood the very small road to drop off and pick up their children. We also have large coaches doing the same with schoolchildren. Also, St James House already creates significant, unberable noise and congestion at times. Their workmen have woken me up on more than 70 ocassions over the last few years. Dumping rubbish and dragging equipment on ashphalt on their grounds from 4-7 am and at weekends. Roofing, noise and nuisance from work men whilst placing scaffolds around the building, etc.

The alarms for St James House used to go off regularly and frequently for up to 15 min. at a time at 4 am at times and it took them a very long time to deactivate it. St James House Building and their offices routinely generate a disporportionate amount of noise in the area from all sources of noise and not just alarms. They had not paid for the repair of their alarm system and neither had they paid for the maintenance of their alarm systems for a long time according to a workman there!

St James House is constantly and gradually being refurbished and maintained. Too much noise and hassle all the time.

St James House also creates traffic on the road whilst their groundsmen make so much excessive noise for several hours at a time with their lawn mowers.

We can not afford any more congestion and noise!

2. I have already seen arguments, shouting, harrassment and intimidation from parents, St James House employees, van drivers, etc, sounding horns for several minutes at a time. The roads nearby are going to get busier and much noisier with delivery trucks, taxis and people descending upon a new premise.

I have already witnessesd furning arguments over car parking spaces among parents and St James House Building office employees and the need for parents to gain quick access to the school.

3. We already get disturbance, noise, shouting, swearing, beer spillages, etc.from drunk and disorderly people coming out of existing adjacement pubs and clubs nearby every week and more so during festivals.

- 4. We already have joy riders esp. during summe Page 256; the roads to feel even "higher" by speeding and making massive noise with their altered exhause pipes and larger engines as well as powerful motorbikes.
- 5. The lovely, peaceful, elegant Catholic Church and its parishoners their would also be in danger from drunk, disorderly, abusive people.
- 6. There would be a greater risk to the health and wellbeing of children in the neareby school with adults also suffering noise, violence, assaults, burglaries and vandalism.
- 7. There would be more drug use closer to our residence, curb crawling, increased trafic from taxis and cabs, suspect individuals loitering about, gambling etc.
- 8. With a new premise, there is very likely going to be abandoned, used contaminated needles found on the roads and pavements with drug dealers hovering about looking for customers.
- 9. There would be increasing costs and hassle for the council, police, fire and other emergency services and hospital clinical staff to deal with drunks, violent and abusive, threatening people.

There would be inconvenience and threats against us too decreasing safety and increasing danger for us residents.

- 10. I personally have poor sleep and little peace and quiet because of noise from parents sounding their horns, as well as from workmen at St James House. At times it is a 24 hour duration noise.
- 11. The location and functionality of this new premise does not match and is totally inappropriate to the requirements of local residents or the Catholic Church or the schools nearby. Our area is already saturated with pubs and clubs on both sides with the centre of town with those already satisfying certain people's demands for such services.
- 12. We residents do not wish to get even more disturbance, nuisance, crime or more disorder, less safety, and more potental harm coming our way.

Chemistry played very loud music and will want to do so again. This noise was, and would be again, a nuisance to residents and parishioners alike.

Chemistry would almost certainly be asking for extended hours at times like Christmas and Easter, when late night services are conducted in St Gregory's church.

Unruly behaviour, often associated with night clubs, can be quite threatening to local residents, many of whom are elderly who would be easily intimidated. Parishioners attending an evening Mass, particularly in winter, could also be intimidated.

I am making these objection representations on behalf of:

- 1. The Parish and Congregation of St Gregory the Great, St James Square, Cheltenham GL50 3PR, which uses the church and adjoining Old Priory Hall (used by a number of secular organisations, as well as the parish), both of which are directly opposite and in very close proximity to the application premises; and
- 2. Myself, as resident of 10, St James Square, diagonally opposite and in close proximity to the application premises.

My representations refer to the Licensing Objectives.

1. The prevention of crime and disorder:

Previous experience from a club on the same premises operating over a period of time showed patrons engaging in anti-social conduct including leaving litter and objects (including drug paraphernalia) in the church grounds and in the street, urinating against and within the Church boundary walls, noise and disruption to nearby premises.

I, and my predecessors, have been consulted by St Gregory's Primary School, which also adjoins the application site, in relation to anti-social behaviour, trespass and articles left on the school premises by past users of the former club premises.

2. Public safety:

This is an issue for the statutory authorities.

3. The prevention of public nuisance:

We have already experienced noise and disrPage 270_{urch services} from the proximity of The Bottle and Sauce, Ambrose Street, as, indeed, have users of St Gregory's church hall, the Old Priory. In the past, the nuisance has been intolerable on occasions. One of my predecessors at St , contacted me to remind me of some of the difficulties he had experienced. He said "I read with dismay that the club "Chemistry" is attempting to reopen. In addition to the problems you highlight in the newsletter was the emergency exit double doorway which opens out at the front (to the left of the entry doors – I think the panels are somewhat boarded rather than glass filled) These were alarmed but were constantly pushed open by patrons exiting the club at the end of the night (2-3am) when everyone was spilling out, setting off the alarm. This noise was worse than the whooping and shouting in the street. In other words staff/management did not ensure that emergency exits were not abused. As my rooms were the 3rd floor front the club was a real nuisance and the alarm sounded, it seemed, every night the club opened. Another thing - Patrons were not allowed park on the roadway leading to the school. This caused a problem one Christmas Eve when parishioners attempting to enter to park in the school grounds (as was the custom on Christmas Eve/Easter Vigil) were turned away by the bouncers. I had to call the police.'

Another predecessor here was forced to sleep in the basement of the house due to noise.

The fact that the premises applying for a licence is in a listed building with single glazing raises real questions about its suitability as a venue to play music, and have dancing etc. There are real issues about noise pollution which the Council has a duty to address as it would almost certainly be within the parameters of a statutory nuisance.

I have no reason to believe that control of the premises would be any more successful in the future. It is inevitable that there will be noise and anti-social behaviour because it is in the nature of licensed premises that the consumption of alcohol by patrons leads to loss of inhibition.

4. The protection of children from harm:

The proposed operating hours include periods when the children will be leaving St Gregory's school. I am particularly concerned that advertising material which is age-inappropriate for the children will be exhibited at the premises, that the children will be exposed to the dangers of passive smoking because of smoke emanating from the outdoor smoking area, and that patrons may act inappropriately towards the children by their language or conduct. I question whether it is appropriate for licensed premises to be in such close proximity to a school.





I am very concerned to hear about the application made to Cheltenham Bo Co. for yet another night club to open in St Jame's Square, opposite ST Gregory's church, in the old GAS building.

I remember when the Gas night club there, and the disruption, noise, and antisocial behaviour was horrendous.

There are late night services at St Gregory's church, especially at Christmas and Easter times, when parishioners who hold 'blue badge' permits attend the Masses will need to park and there would be no room for them if that club was there.

The services would be disrupted by the noise and often fighting outside the old club, which, no doubt recur if the club re opens.

On Sunday mornings, in 'Gas club' days there would be litter, beer cans, and often broken bottles thrown into the church grounds where children and families had to walk over to get to church. Often there was vomit on the surrounding pavements.

I feel it would be bad for Cheltenham to risk those problems returning if another club opens so near to our church.

I am writing to make a representation concerning a New Premises Licence application made for a late night drinking venue, "Chemistry", at Gibson House, St James' Square, Cheltenham (ref: 20/00454/PRMA).

As a local resident living on St James' Square, just around the corner from Gibson House, I wish to express my concerns about and objections to the New Premises Licence application based on the limited grounds of three of the Licensing Objectives.

Firstly, with reference to the Licensing Objective of the Prevention of Public Nuisance, I believe that the sale of alcohol and playing of regulated entertainment until 00:00 hours Monday-Saturday, and until 22:00 hours on Sundays, will cause unsociable noise nuisance both during the premises' opening hours and at unacceptably late times after closing as people leave the premises and pass through the neighbourhood. The apartments located in the middle of the building in which I reside, my apartment included, are fitted with full-length windows only on the side of the building closest to Gibson House, and do not have any other windows. This means that in order to get fresh air and an air flow, particularly in the summer months, there is no other option but to open these large windows which face the direction of Gibson House, meaning that any noise nuisance would most definitely affect residents.

Additionally, where alcohol is sold in bottles, it is likely that these will be left as litter around the premises. The premises are in very close proximity to a primary school, and glass bottles, whether broken or whole, may cause harm to young children as they make their way to and from school.

Secondly, with reference to the Licensing Objective of the Prevention of Crime and Disorder, people who have drunk large or excessive amounts of alcohol may be likely to act in a disorderly manor outside or when leaving the premises, disturbing others and making the neighbourhood a less-desirable place to live and visit. Street car parking is located immediately outside the premises, and vehicles may suffer damage from drunk and disorderly people leaving the premises.

Finally, with reference to the LIcensing Objective of Public Safety, if smokers crowd the area on the pavement outside of the entrance to the premises, pedestrians may be forced to step into the road when passing by.

We are writing to object about the application for a New Premises Licence at Gibson House St James Square.

Background to location:

We are a primarily a residential street, although St Georges Terrace is located close to the town centre, we are located on the residential side of St Georges Place, which would appear the natural cut off for restaurants/bars/clubs in our area. There are already numerous

3

restaurants and brasserie style eateries along this road and on tPage 284e of it. The bus station and taxi rank, being located where they are, mean that current footfall from restaurants and bars do not tend to encroach on our road.

Although The Old Firestation is a small restaurant/bar, it is separated from the residential properties of St James Square, as it is the end property and relatively small with limited covers. However, we can find festive periods and race weeks particularly troublesome with noise and disturbance. Given the size and location of Gibson House we fear considerable night time footfall and consequently disturbance, noise, litter, vandalism and local crime may increase as a result.

Public nuisance:

Noise disturbance:

Our property is grade 2 listed. The sash windows in our property are glazed in original thin crown glass, secondary glazing is not an option. We are therefore worried about night time noise disturbance while people walk to and from bars in town or to the local taxi rank.

Protection of children from harm:

Adult content conversations and swearing

Given our children sleep at the front of the house, we are gravely concerned they will be exposed to inappropriate adult conversation and swearing as people walk past, arriving or leaving the premises. This we feel is potentially harmful and unavoidable if the application were granted.

Traffic and safety crossing the roads

The road in front of Gibson House is already hazardous to cross. With increased delivery vehicles parking up outside the property, obscuring the mini roundabouts and increased traffic caused by increased footfall, this is likely to increase exponentially. Not only are we concerned for the safety of our own children and those that live within our neighbourhood, but also those walking to the local school (St Gregorys).

Public safety:

Traffic congestion and road crossing danger

Given the limited space for parking in our area, it is likely vehicles will double park to drop off outside the venue. This is potentially very dangerous, given its close proximity to the roundabouts and bus stop. There is no safe crossing at all on St James Square, with increased parking, delivery vehicles, refuse collection in the street, this is likely to become more hazardous.

Prevention of crime and disorder:

Vandalism, theft and damage:

We have had local vandalisation within our area, cars have been damaged, graffiti to local buildings and items stollen from outside the house historically. Given the increased footfall and increased number of people under the influence of alcohol this is again likely to increase.

Looking at local police crime reports, there is evidence of an increased number of criminal activities on St Georges Place, compared to St James Square/St Georges Terrace. Likely to directly relate to the number of licensed properties in these vicinities.

Evidence of local crime would be likely to increase again and this can be supported by the increase in number of crime rates within our area when Chemistry was open, compared to recent years, when we have become an entirely residential neighbourhood.

Places of worship:

The property involved is opposite a place of worship. It is a place for quiet reflection and part of our history as a town. It would appear entirely inappropriate to have a potentially busy and noisy restaurant/club directly opposite a quiet place of worship and contemplation.

Conclusion:

We are not in objection to Gibson House being developed into flats as previously proposed, in fact we would love to see the historic building restored to its former glory as a residential property or offices, where the foot fall, noise disturbance, smoking issues would be significantly less in what is a friendly residential community.

We feel very strongly regarding this matter and strongly object to the application on the basis of noise disturbance, increased crime and vandalism and increased litter, all resulting in public nuisance, in what is a residential community area.

Referring to specific problems with the objectives stated below, I have added some comments:

1. The prevention of crime and disorder;

Anti Social behaviour is the largest crime type in Cheltenham. From February 2019 to January 2020, it accounted for 31.52%. (Police UK). Another entertainment venue serving alcohol until midnight would increase the problem in a largely residential area with a church opposite and a primary school nearby.

2. Public safety;

I do not believe the area is monitored by CCTV and is a bit away from main town centre, so harder to police.

3. The prevention of public nuisance;

I understand that the licence requests that they may sell alcohol and provide entertainment to its patrons from 10 am to midnight (Sundays 10PM). This would result in the real possibility of noise affecting Parish services and activities.

Respect and quiet should be given to places of worship. For example, Christmas Eve Church Mass would be greatly affected by the noise and disruption.

I refer to the above application and wish to make representations against the granting of the application for the following reasons.

The prevention of Crime & Disorder

In its previous incarnation, it has been said that there were many instances of anti-social behaviour by the club's customers in and around the environs of St. Gregory's school and St. Gregory's church. Discarded needles were found in the area clearly suggesting the use of prohibited substances.

The prevention of Public Nuisance

Freedom of religion and worship is recognised as a fundamental and legal human right and that it should be enjoyed in reasonable peace and quiet. With the club in full operation, there will be intrusive and distracting noise in the Church during regular services made even worse when the windows of the club are open. Also, it is likely that customers of the club would regularly be present in numbers outside of the premises both for the purpose of smoking tobacco and/or other substances and queuing for entrance. Parishioners are therefore likely to be unable to avoid encountering individuals or groups of individuals in varying degrees of intoxication as they make their way to and from Church. With the current popular contempt for church going, it is almost certain that parishioners would be subject to some form of verbal and/or other abuse.

Furthermore, it would appear that previously when the club was open, individuals were observed in the environs of both the school and the church engaging in certain forms of anti-social behaviour which would be better kept within the constraints of private property.

If public nuisances were to occur and parishioners were to suffer such that their human rights were infringed, it is possible that the view could be taken that the Council, by virtue of facilitating this behaviour by the grant of the licence, were vicariously liable for the damage suffered. This is not a risk any responsible council should take.

I write to raise objections to this Alcohol License application.


I find it strange that someone is planning to re-open only the Basement of a building that has been empty since, I believe, 2005. Last time the owner invited local residents to visit the site, it was in poor condition.

In its previous incarnation at Chemistry Nightclub, there were numerous problems relating to noise and anti-social behaviour. Although I appreciate this may not be relevant if the applicant is a different potential licensee.

However, since the building was originally converted into an entertainment venue and granted an alcohol licence, the area has changed significantly and become much more residential. The university's Shaftesbury Hall site has been converted into a development of 70 flats and 14 houses. Offices on St James Square have been converted to flats and there have been new-build flats behind Waitrose. These residents are well served by local, well-run pubs, cafes and restaurants.

The Council may still, technically, regard this address as "town centre" and thus relevant to the night-time economy but this does not make sense if you walk round the area.

Additionally, there is very limited parking for residents, let alone customers.

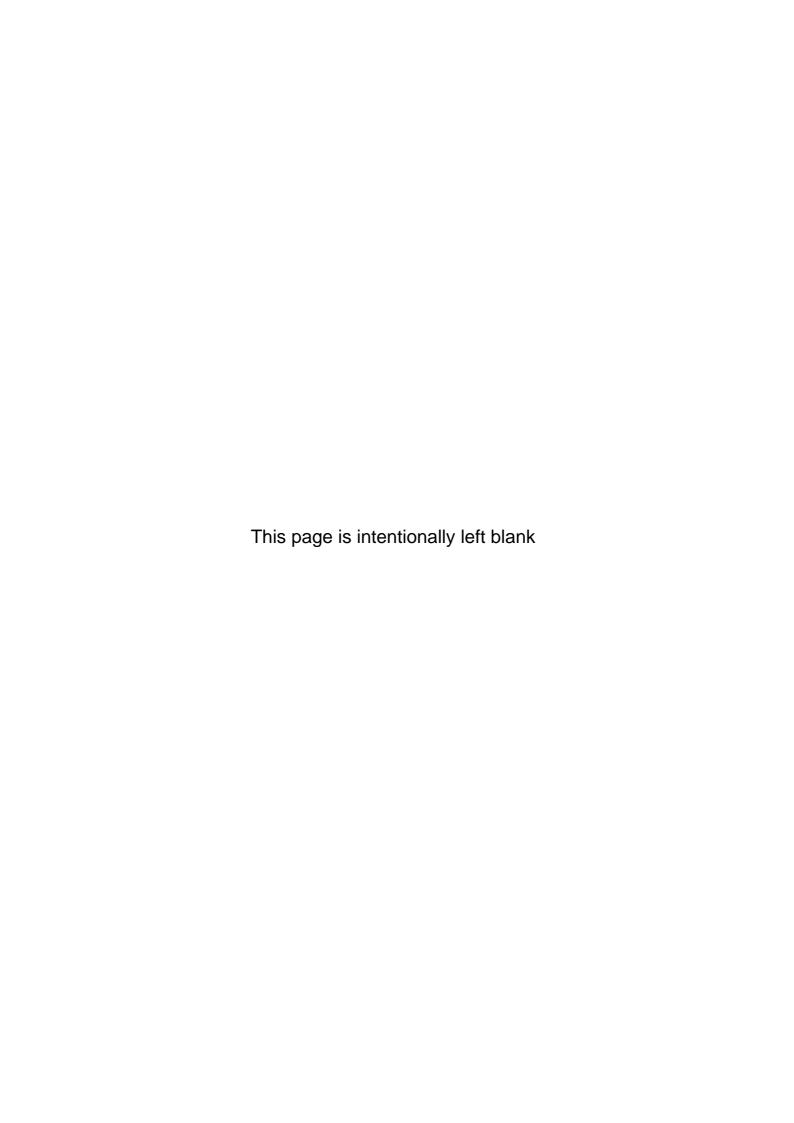



As a long-term parishioner of St Gregory's Church, which is located directly opposite the above premises, I wish to object to the grant of this new licence for the following reasons.

1. When the Chemistry Cub was operating previously, noise generated by the club was a public nuisance which in particular disturbed evening services at St Gregory's Church.

Much of the noise was generated by groups of people arriving or departing or standing outside smoking, so could not be controlled by the licensee, but was a consequence of the use of the building. The acoustic insulation of Gibson House also appeared to be inadequate, as frequently music and noise from within the club could be heard in the street.

This nuisance was particular bad at times such as Christmas and Easter, when larger numbers at the club coincided with church services.

- 2. Another consequence of the use of Gibson House as licenced premises was the deposit of hazardous materials (needles, broken glass, vomit) around the entrance to the church.
- This constituted a hazard for parishioners (including young children) coming to the daily morning services in the church before the a clean-up could take place.
- 3. The presence of needles and other drug equipment in the church area suggested that drug users were taking advantage of the church grounds for covert activity. This ceased when the Chemistry Club closed, which implies that it was associated with users of the licenced premises.

I have been a parishioner of St Gregory's Church, opposite the above premises, for many years and I remember the difficulties that we experienced when there was a night club operating there. I am very much against permission being given for the re-opening of a night club, in an area which is largely residential, and wish to make the following comments.

- 1. Noise generated by the club was a nuisance and disturbed evening services at St Gregory's especially at Easter and Christmas. Our parishioners who lived in the nearby flats were disturbed late at night by the noise. Often people stood outside the premises smoking or drinking and crossed the road to the church area. Evening services were disturbed by people congregating outside the door and shouting and damage was caused to the church building.
- 2. Large groups of people arriving and departing from the premises created a lot of noise and confusion. Parishioners trying to cross the road when there were many people milling about on the road found the situation very dangerous. Vehicles enter the Square from Ambrose Street very quickly and traffic from the roundabout, near the car park also moves quickly making it difficult to cross the road safely even when sober!
- 3. It was obvious from the discarded needles and other drug equipment which we found in the garden area and behind the church that the area was used by drug takers and the appearance of condoms suggested that other activities took place.
- 4. Broken glass and needles around the church area are a hazard for children entering, or walking round, the church and vomit can be a hazard for children and elderly people alike who may not notice it until too late.

It was a relief when the nightclub closed.



The premises' close proximity to both a church and a primary school is inappropriate. There is a considerable risk of drug use near the premises and therefore the potential for drugs paraphernalia being found by children on their way to or from the nearby primary school. The all-day licence also potentially exposes the children to drink-related anti-social behaviour. 



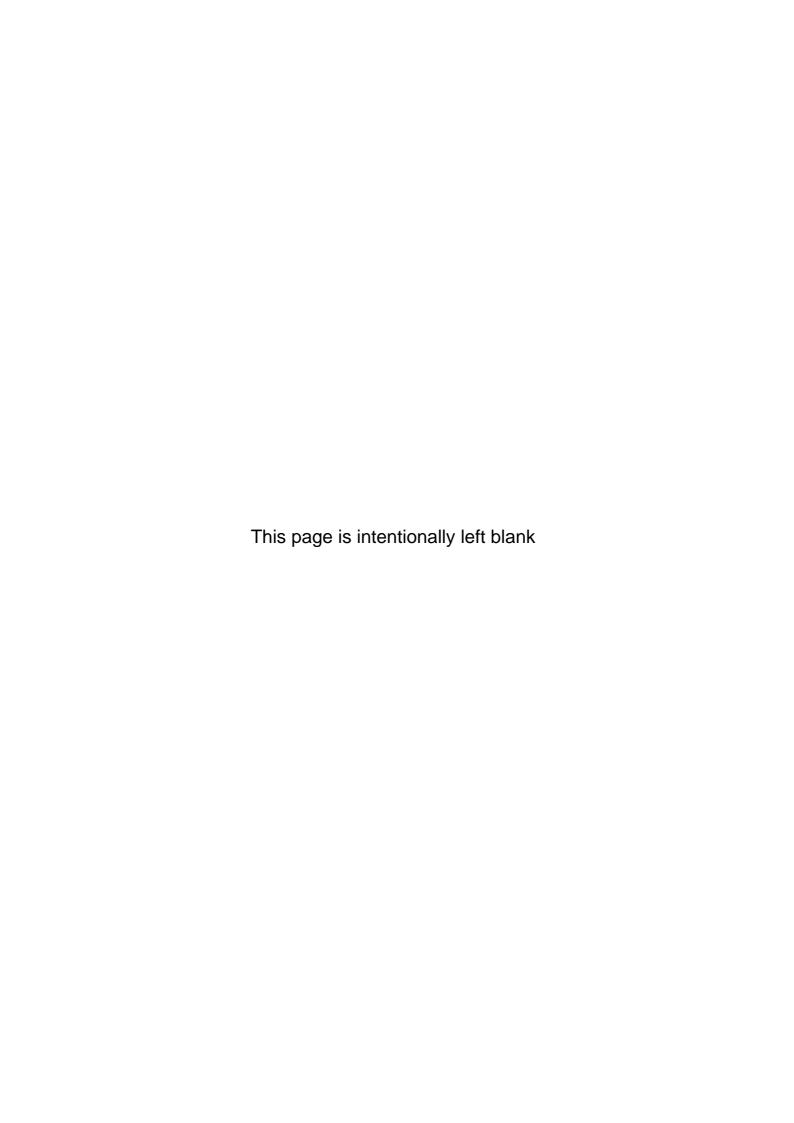

I am owner occupier of a ground floor flat which backs onto Gibson House and it's land / footprint. I live in my flat with my husband and daughter. To date this has been a largely peaceful and enjoyable place to live.

If the license is granted, a club operating minimum 12-14 hours a day will be literally right behind us. Unless smokers are allowed to spill onto the payment, the only place I can foresee the smoking area will be adjacent to my property - a metre or two from where my child is playing and sleeping. Noise from the workmen, who appear to have already started on the property, travels through to my home already. The noise of a club until midnight six days a week and with extensions for holidays and race week would be

extremely distressing for my family and could be Page 358 upsetting for a small child. I have lived in more central areas of Cheltenham and when one can hear people leaving clubs there are often screams and squeals and it's difficult to tell if it is revellers or someone coming to harm.

I would feel very vulnerable sleeping in my own home if my husband (a Doctor who does evening on calls) was not present.

Safety

The junction / corner of Knapp Road and St James Square is already very busy. One has to use full concentration when crossing from Knapp Road to St Gregory's church, or Knapp Road one side to the other. There is poor visibility due to parked cars, so even when sober in the daytime one has to judge one's moment carefully. People arriving and leaving from this junction in dusk or dark under the influence of alcohol and with the distractions of socialising could be fatal. Parking and cars are already an issue here with people parking and waiting on double yellows and residents bays being used by non-residents. Adding a club to this would further stress a limited capacity.

Community

The area where Gibson house is situated is where Cheltenham starts to turn more residential. There is a nursery and retirement home on Knapp Road as well as a Nursery and Primary school on St James Square. A nightclub is not what this area needs. There are often funerals being held directly opposite where this club would be, a club would be totally inappropriate.



I have serious reservations about the wisdom of permitting the above licence application.

At present, the area is one of mixed use, including 2 public houses and a restaurant (the Fire Station), in conjunction with places of worship, schools and cultural facilities, as well as many residential properties, including for the elderly. A balance in the type of groups using this area is necessary to make it work for all of them. I believe that use of Gibson House, as outlined in its application, would cause <u>a public nuisance</u> to nearby properties by upsetting the balance that currently allows peaceful and respectful co-existence. Many buildings in the area, including St Gregory's Church, are not able to be double or triple glazed and are particularly sensitive to environmental factors.

The traffic and pedestrian arrangement of St James Square/Clarence Street/Ambrose Street/ Knapp Road is already busy, including being a major bus route, and with very limited parking space. Access to Gibson House would be problematic, especially when it involved people congregating on the pavement as part of

the use of the premises. I believe it would cause $Page\ 367_{\underline{e}\ less\ safe}$ in using the pavements and crossing the road.

Previous experience of the Chemistry nightclub by parishioners of St Gregory's Catholic Church (opposite Gibson House) involved a substantial amount of unsavoury refuse being left on the church walls or thrown into the church gardens: drinks containers, condoms, waste food. Loud noise, shouting and swearing, and occasionally <u>unsociable or aggressive behaviour</u> inevitably accompany late-night entertainment. This would be distressing for residents and passersby, but especially for elderly people and children attending church services or church-related events in the adjoining Old Priory. The proximity of St Gregory's School and Elephant Moon nursery would unavoidably <u>expose very young children to these undesirable consequences</u>.

Without making any judgement about the nature of the New Premises Licence being applied for, I believe the location of Gibson House makes it an unsuitable venue for this licence, and that representations and assurances to the contrary could not realistically be met.

We believe an application has been made to Cheltenham Borough Council for a New Premises Licence at the old 'Chemistry' premises, allowing the sale of alcohol and providing entertainment to its patrons — every day of the week from 10.00am until midnight (10.00pm on Sundays), and with the possibility of extended hours on special occasions including Christmas Eve, New Year's Eve and Race Days.

Obviously this will become a noise pollution problem and more than likely we can anticipate some anti-social behaviour toward the people/premises in the locality along with St. Gregory's Church opposite the venue. The Church in particular and School/businesses in the area will have to tolerate the same problems for which the Club was renowned in the past and I am aghast that Cheltenham Borough Council would find good enough reasons to reinstigate problems again; in light of the amount of children and families who travel the area daily.

We wish to complain about this application and request that a licence is not granted based on the following Licencing Objectives:

- 1. The prevention of crime and disorder:
- 2. Public safety:
- 3. The prevention of public nuisance:
- 4. The protection and Safeguarding of children and vulnerable adults.

Previous operations at the Chemistry premises led to a range of issues arising and there is every possibility of repeating history – in today's circumstances the situation may be considerably worse.

Drug needles and residue as well as used contraceptives were found previously in St Gregory's Church surroundings and local resident's premises. This is an obvious safeguarding issue and a concern in terms of health and safety.

The above would no doubt be repeated and pose a highly significant risk to a lot of people young and old. Safeguarding children, young people and older adults in particular, could become a significant Safeguarding threat and should be a major concern for the Council. We already have enough pulls on budgets and need to consider our depleted Police force, and NHS (who end up picking up the outfall) both under extreme pressure to manage an already unbearable load. The Council must recognise its Duty of Care to the residents of the town, basing any judgement on the effects and costs to the local community of such a move.

We understand that the owners of the Chemistry premises might suggest they will take measures to prevent any anti-social behaviour occurring — but we also recognise they have no responsibility for so called mature adults once outside of their premises, particularly under the influence of drink and drugs. We live in uncertain times, where respect and concern for the elderly and vulnerable young children/teenagers no longer appear to be a priority in the wider community and it is in this regard I would ask that the Council take full responsibility for protecting the citizens of this town.

Noise pollution would affect all in the surrounding area and beyond. Re-opening Chemistry presents a major blot on the landscape of Cheltenham and does little to rid Cheltenham of a larger-lout culture. The Council is supposedly trying to remove anti-social behaviour and promote a more sophisticated culture, to even consider this proposal is a negative in terms of this town. Already we have witnessed outside 'Cavendish House' young people rolling drugs and gathering along the Promenade – Cheltenham's finest area is already becoming a blot on the landscape.

We need a Council prepared to make difficult decisions and find the conviction to promote Cheltenham as a fine place to live, visit and enjoy. Our roads and pavements are beginning to look shabby and we have many homeless people appearing on the streets; which is another concern. It is wrong to bend to propositions which can only end in tears, inflicting anxiety on local residents and patrons/or businesses in the area. We should be encouraging our young people to have a healthy lifestyle, not to be found in late night bars and clubs, as history has shown us.

I hope that the Council see fit to reject this application on both moral and financial grounds. We need to recognise we are only leading our young people down the road of destruction. Goodness me, enough of our own generation have done enough damage in the past; wouldn't it be sad to watch our young people and those with little hope to end up in the gutter along with the residue of their bad habits; thrust upon them by those with less than scrupulous intentions.....

I am writing to object to the above licensing application on the following grounds:

- The prevention of public nuisance
- The protection of children from harm
- 1) The prevention of public nuisance.

Past experience with licensed premises at this location shows that public nuisance is highly likely if granted, in view of the largely residential character of the neighbourhood. Residents would be exposed to loud music until late at night, with limited opportunity for soundproofing what is, I understand, a listed building. Loud music at night that is outside one's own control, heard from within one's own home, leads to a severe deterioration of quality of life. Any services held in St Gergory's Church on the other side of the road at times when the club is open would be likely to be disturbed by music.

Local residents would also inevitably be disturbed late at night by patrons arriving at and leaving the club adding further public nuisance.

Nightclubs often lead to a higher level of rubbish and debris in the immediate area, including drug paraphernalia, and this would also constitute a public nuisance for the residents. This again was evident when the premises was a nightclub previously.

2) The protection of children.

The proposed nightclub is in close proximity to St Gregory's Primary School, which I believe is not consistent with the protection of children from harm. When arriving at the school they would be likely to have to negotiate debris from the night before, and if the club opens at 10am there is the likelihood of primary school children and patrons mixing. Without wishing to presume the worst of people I believe this is likely to result in a reduction in the safety of the environment for the children.

I am writing to submit my objection to the above alcohol licensing application in Gibson House. I am a resident of Chelsea Square, which is located close to the venue for which the application is being made.

Approval of the application is very likely to have a substantial negative impact on local residents. There are multiple areas of concern.

My primary concern is that another venue serving alcohol would worsen the anti-social behaviour we already experience late at night and into the early hours of the morning.

A few examples of this anti-social behaviour are:

- Damage to a resident's car parked on Clarence Street overnight. (Based on the damage it appeared that someone had jumped repeatedly on the car roof.)
- Damage to the stone sculpture on top of the pillars supporting the gates at the entrance to the Square.
- Excessive noise in the early hours of the morning.

The new venue would also put us at risk of increased traffic on already busy roads, and exacerbation of existing parking issues.

As someone who has lived in this area for many years, it is evident that the area has changed in nature over the last decade. It is now primarily residential. The plans therefore have the potential to disrupt the daily life of our usually peaceful community.

I wish to express my firm disagreement as a citizen and resident of Cheltenham to this Licence being approved. This is based on the following grounds:




- Parking: The streets in this parking zone are already really congested. I don't see how the club could have any dedicated parking for all their customers or staff either.

I hope you can understand my points, and take the above into consideration.






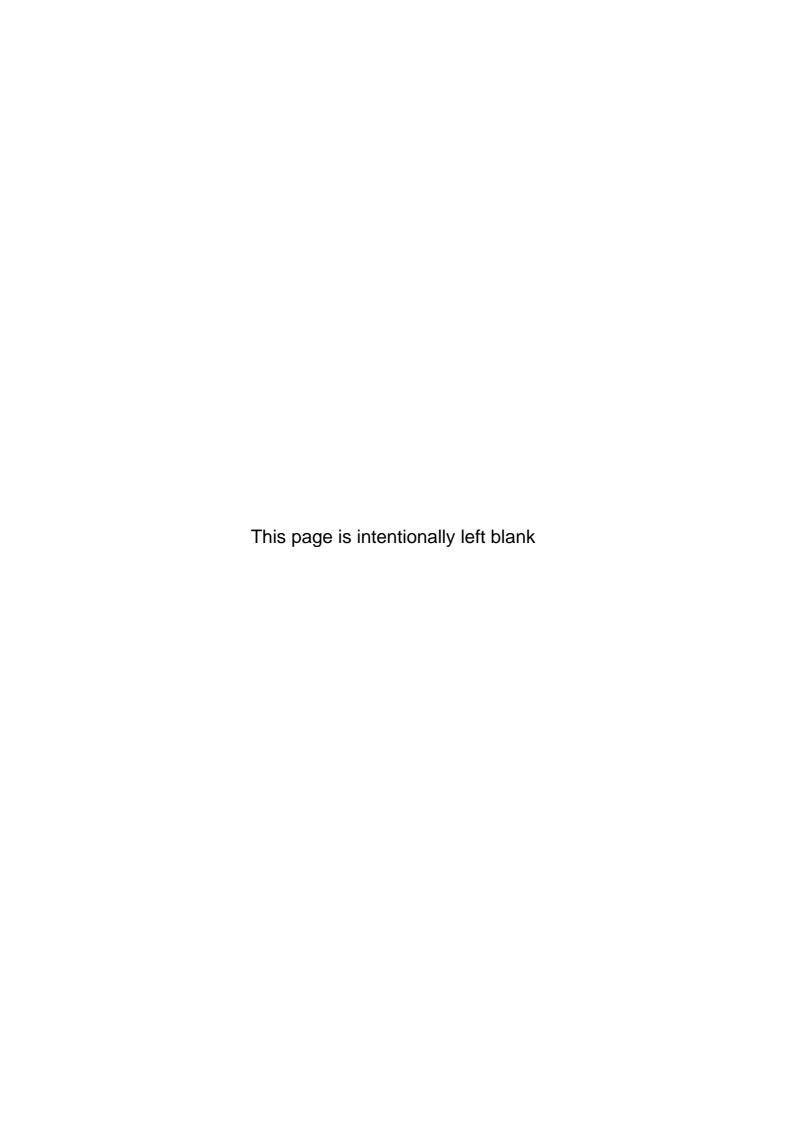

The Licensing Act 2003

- 1.2 The legislation provides a clear focus on the promotion of four statutory objectives which must be addressed when licensing functions are undertaken.
- 1.3 The licensing objectives are:
- The prevention of crime and disorder;
- Public safety;
- The prevention of public nuisance; and
- The protection of children from harm.

- 1.4 Each objective is of equal importance. There are no other statutory licensing objectives, so that the promotion of the four objectives is a paramount consideration at all times.
- 1.5 However, the legislation also supports a number of other key aims and purposes. These are vitally important and should be principal aims for everyone involved in licensing work. They include:
- protecting the public and local residents from crime, anti-social behaviour and noise nuisance caused by irresponsible licensed premises;
- giving the police and licensing authorities the powers they need to effectively manage and police the nighttime economy and take action against those premises that are causing problems;
- recognising the important role which pubs and other licensed premises play in our local communities by minimising the regulatory burden on business, encouraging innovation and supporting responsible premises;
- providing a regulatory framework for alcohol which reflects the needs of local communities and empowers local authorities to make and enforce decisions about the most appropriate licensing strategies for their local area; and
- encouraging greater community involvement in licensing decisions and giving local residents the opportunity to have their say regarding licensing decisions that may affect them.

The guidance

1.6 Section 182 of the 2003 Act provides that the Secretary of State must issue and, from time to time, may revise guidance to licensing authorities on the discharge of their functions under the 2003 Act.

Purpose

1.7 This Guidance is provided to licensing authorities in relation to the carrying out of their functions under the 2003 Act. It also provides information to magistrates' courts hearing appeals against licensing decisions and has been made widely available for the benefit of those who run licensed premises, their legal advisers and the general public. It is a key medium for promoting best practice, ensuring consistent application of licensing powers across England and Wales and for promoting fairness, equal treatment and proportionality.

...

Legal status

- 1.9 Section 4 of the 2003 Act provides that, in carrying out its functions, a licensing authority must 'have regard to' guidance issued by the Secretary of State under section 182. This Guidance is therefore binding on all licensing authorities to that extent. However, this Guidance cannot anticipate every possible scenario or set of circumstances that may arise and, as long as licensing authorities have properly understood this Guidance, they may depart from it if they have good reason to do so and can provide full reasons. Departure from this Guidance could give rise to an appeal or judicial review, and the reasons given will then be a key consideration for the courts when considering the lawfulness and merits of any decision taken.
- 1.10 Nothing in this Guidance should be taken as indicating that any requirement of licensing law or any other law may be overridden (including the obligations placed on any public authorities under human rights legislation). This Guidance does not in any way replace the statutory provisions of the 2003 Act or add to its scope and licensing authorities should note that interpretation of the 2003 Act is a matter for the courts. Licensing authorities and others using this Guidance must take their own professional and legal advice about its implementation.

Licensing policies

- 1.11 Section 5 of the 2003 Act requires a licensing authority to determine and publish a statement of its licensing policy at least once every five years. The policy must be published before it carries out any licensing functions under the 2003 Act.
- 1.12 However, determining and publishing a statement of its policy is a licensing function and as such the authority must have regard to this Guidance when taking this step. A licensing authority may depart from its own policy if the individual circumstances of any case merit such a decision in the interests of the promotion of the licensing objectives. But once again, it is important that it should be able to give full reasons for departing from its published statement of licensing policy. Where revisions to this Guidance are issued by the Secretary of State, there may be a period of time when the licensing policy statement is inconsistent with the Guidance (for example, during any consultation by the licensing authority). In these circumstances, the licensing authority should have regard, and give appropriate weight, to this Guidance and its own existing licensing policy statement.

...

General principles

1.15 If an application for a premises licence or club premises certificate has been made lawfully and there have been no representations from responsible authorities or other persons, the licensing authority must grant the application, subject only to conditions that are consistent with the operating schedule and relevant mandatory conditions. It is recommended that licence applicants contact responsible authorities when preparing their operating schedules.

Licence conditions - general principles

- 1.16 Conditions on a premises licence or club premises certificate are important in setting the parameters within which premises can lawfully operate. The use of wording such as "must", "shall" and "will" is encouraged. Licence conditions:
- must be appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives;
- must be precise and enforceable;
- must be unambiguous and clear in what they intend to achieve;
- should not duplicate other statutory requirements or other duties or responsibilities placed on the employer by other legislation;
- must be tailored to the individual type, location and characteristics of the premises and events concerned;
- should not be standardised and may be unlawful when it cannot be demonstrated that they are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives in an individual case;
- should not replicate offences set out in the 2003 Act or other legislation;
- should be proportionate, justifiable and be capable of being met;
- cannot seek to manage the behaviour of customers once they are beyond the direct management of the licence holder and their staff, but may impact on the behaviour of customers in the immediate vicinity of the premises or as they enter or leave; and
- should be written in a prescriptive format.

Each application on its own merits

1.17 Each application must be considered on its own merits and in accordance with the licensing authority's statement of licensing policy; for example, if the application falls within the scope of a cumulative impact policy. Conditions attached to licences and certificates must be tailored to the individual type, location and characteristics of the premises and events concerned. This is essential to avoid the imposition of disproportionate and overly burdensome conditions on premises where there is no need for such conditions. Standardised conditions should be avoided and indeed may be unlawful where they cannot be shown to be appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives in an individual case.

...

Other relevant legislation

- 1.19 While licence conditions should not duplicate other statutory provisions, licensing authorities and licensees should be mindful of requirements and responsibilities placed on them by other legislation. Legislation which may be relevant includes:
- The Gambling Act 2005
- The Environmental Protection Act 1990
- The Noise Act 1996
- The Clean Neighbourhoods and Environmental Act 2005
- The Regulatory Reform (Fire Safety) Order 2005
- The Health and Safety at Work etc. Act 1974
- The Equality Act 2010
- The Immigration Act 2016
- Regulators' Code under the Legislative and Regulatory Reform Act 2006
- 2. The licensing objectives

Crime and disorder

2.1 Licensing authorities should look to the police as the main source of advice on crime and disorder. They should also seek to involve the local Community Safety Partnership (CSP).

...

- 2.3 Conditions should be targeted on deterrence and preventing crime and disorder including the prevention of illegal working in licensed premises (see paragraph 10.10). For example, where there is good reason to suppose that disorder may take place, the presence of closed-circuit television (CCTV) cameras both inside and immediately outside the premises can actively deter disorder, nuisance, anti-social behaviour and crime generally. Some licence holders may wish to have cameras on their premises for the prevention of crime directed against the business itself, its staff, or its customers. But any condition may require a broader approach, and it may be appropriate to ensure that the precise location of cameras is set out on plans to ensure that certain areas are properly covered and there is no subsequent dispute over the terms of the condition.
- 2.4 The inclusion of radio links and ring-round phone systems should be considered an appropriate condition for public houses, bars and nightclubs operating in city and town centre leisure areas with a high density of licensed

premises. These systems allow managers of licensed premises to communicate instantly with the police and facilitate a rapid response to any disorder which may be endangering the customers and staff on the premises.

- 2.5 Conditions relating to the management competency of designated premises supervisors should not normally be attached to premises licences. It will normally be the responsibility of the premises licence holder as an employer, and not the licensing authority, to ensure that the managers appointed at the premises are competent and appropriately trained. The designated premises supervisor is the key person who will usually be responsible for the day to day management of the premises by the premises licence holder, including the prevention of disorder. A condition of this kind may only be justified as appropriate in rare circumstances where it can be demonstrated that, in the circumstances associated with particular premises, poor management competency could give rise to issues of crime and disorder and public safety.
- 2.6 The prevention of crime includes the prevention of immigration crime including the prevention of illegal working in licensed premises. Licensing authorities should work with Home Office Immigration Enforcement, as well as the police, in respect of these matters. Licence conditions that are considered appropriate for the prevention of illegal working in licensed premises might include requiring a premises licence holder to undertake right to work checks on all staff employed at the licensed premises or requiring that a copy of any document checked as part of a right to work check are retained at the licensed premises.

Public safety

- 2.7 Licence holders have a responsibility to ensure the safety of those using their premises, as a part of their duties under the 2003 Act. This concerns the safety of people using the relevant premises rather than public health which is addressed in other legislation. Physical safety includes the prevention of accidents and injuries and other immediate harms that can result from alcohol consumption such as unconsciousness or alcohol poisoning. Conditions relating to public safety may also promote the crime and disorder objective as noted above. There will of course be occasions when a public safety condition could incidentally benefit a person's health more generally, but it should not be the purpose of the condition as this would be outside the licensing authority's powers (be ultra vires) under the 2003 Act. Conditions should not be imposed on a premises licence or club premises certificate which relate to cleanliness or hygiene.
- 2.8 A number of matters should be considered in relation to public safety. These may include:
- Fire safety;
- Ensuring appropriate access for emergency services such as ambulances;
- Good communication with local authorities and emergency services, for example communications networks with the police and signing up for local incident alerts (see paragraph 2.4 above);
- Ensuring the presence of trained first aiders on the premises and appropriate first aid kits;
- Ensuring the safety of people when leaving the premises (for example, through the provision of information on late-night transportation);
- Ensuring appropriate and frequent waste disposal, particularly of glass bottles;
- Ensuring appropriate limits on the maximum capacity of the premises (see paragraphs 2.12-2.13, and Chapter 10; and
- Considering the use of CCTV in and around the premises (as noted in paragraph 2.3 above, this may also assist with promoting the crime and disorder objective).

2.9 The measures that are appropriate to promote public safety will vary between premises and the matters listed above may not apply in all cases. As set out in Chapter 8 (8.38- 8.46), applicants should consider when making their application which steps it is appropriate to take to promote the public safety objective and demonstrate how they achieve that.

Ensuring safe departure of those using the premises

- 2.10 Licence holders should make provision to ensure that premises users safely leave their premises. Measures that may assist include:
- Providing information on the premises of local taxi companies who can provide safe transportation home; and
- Ensuring adequate lighting outside the premises, particularly on paths leading to and from the premises and in car parks.

Maintenance and repair

2.11 Where there is a requirement in other legislation for premises open to the public or for employers to possess certificates attesting to the safety or satisfactory nature of certain equipment or fixtures on the premises, it would be inappropriate for a licensing condition to require possession of such a certificate. However, it would be permissible to require as a condition of a licence or certificate, if appropriate, checks on this equipment to be conducted at specified intervals and for evidence of these checks to be retained by the premises licence holder or club provided this does not duplicate or gold-plate a requirement in other legislation. Similarly, it would be permissible for licensing authorities, if they receive relevant representations from responsible authorities or any other persons, to attach conditions which require equipment of particular standards to be maintained on the premises. Responsible authorities – such as health and safety authorities – should therefore make their expectations clear in this respect to enable prospective licence holders or clubs to prepare effective operating schedules and club operating schedules.

Safe capacities

- 2.12 "Safe capacities" should only be imposed where appropriate for the promotion of public safety or the prevention of disorder on the relevant premises. For example, if a capacity has been imposed through other legislation, it would be inappropriate to reproduce it in a premises licence. Indeed, it would also be wrong to lay down conditions which conflict with other legal requirements. However, if no safe capacity has been imposed through other legislation, a responsible authority may consider it appropriate for a new capacity to be attached to the premises which would apply at any material time when the licensable activities are taking place and make representations to that effect. For example, in certain circumstances, capacity limits may be appropriate in preventing disorder, as overcrowded venues can increase the risks of crowds becoming frustrated and hostile.
- 2.13 The permitted capacity is a limit on the number of persons who may be on the premises at any time, following a recommendation by the relevant fire and rescue authority under the Regulatory Reform (Fire Safety) Order 2005. For any application for a premises licence or club premises certificate for premises without an existing permitted capacity where the applicant wishes to take advantage of the special provisions set out in section 177 of the 2003 Act , the applicant should conduct their own risk assessment as to the appropriate capacity of the premises. They should send their recommendation to the fire and rescue authority which will consider it and decide what the "permitted capacity" of those premises should be.
- 2.14 Public safety may include the safety of performers appearing at any premises, but does not extend to the prevention of injury from participation in a boxing or wrestling entertainment.

Public nuisance

- 2.15 The 2003 Act enables licensing authorities and responsible authorities, through representations, to consider what constitutes public nuisance and what is appropriate to prevent it in terms of conditions attached to specific premises licences and club premises certificates. It is therefore important that in considering the promotion of this licensing objective, licensing authorities and responsible authorities focus on the effect of the licensable activities at the specific premises on persons living and working (including those carrying on business) in the area around the premises which may be disproportionate and unreasonable. The issues will mainly concern noise nuisance, light pollution, noxious smells and litter.
- 2.16 Public nuisance is given a statutory meaning in many pieces of legislation. It is however not narrowly defined in the 2003 Act and retains its broad common law meaning. It may include in appropriate circumstances the reduction of the living and working amenity and environment of other persons living and working in the area of the licensed premises. Public nuisance may also arise as a result of the adverse effects of artificial light, dust, odour and insects or where its effect is prejudicial to health.
- 2.17 Conditions relating to noise nuisance will usually concern steps appropriate to control the levels of noise emanating from premises. This might be achieved by a simple measure such as ensuring that doors and windows are kept closed after a particular time, or persons are not permitted in garden areas of the premises after a certain time. More sophisticated measures like the installation of acoustic curtains or rubber speaker mounts to mitigate sound escape from the premises may be appropriate. However, conditions in relation to live or recorded music may not be enforceable in circumstances where the entertainment activity itself is not licensable (see chapter 16). Any conditions appropriate to promote the prevention of public nuisance should be tailored to the type, nature and characteristics of the specific premises and its licensable activities. Licensing authorities should avoid inappropriate or disproportionate measures that could deter events that are valuable to the community, such as live music. Noise limiters, for example, are expensive to purchase and install and are likely to be a considerable burden for smaller venues.
- 2.18 As with all conditions, those relating to noise nuisance may not be appropriate in certain circumstances where provisions in other legislation adequately protect those living in the area of the premises. But as stated earlier in this Guidance, the approach of licensing authorities and responsible authorities should be one of prevention and when their powers are engaged, licensing authorities should be aware of the fact that other legislation may not adequately cover concerns raised in relevant representations and additional conditions may be appropriate.
- 2.19 Where applications have given rise to representations, any appropriate conditions should normally focus on the most sensitive periods. For example, the most sensitive period for people being disturbed by unreasonably loud music is at night and into the early morning when residents in adjacent properties may be attempting to go to sleep or are sleeping. This is why there is still a need for a licence for performances of live music between 11 pm and 8 am. In certain circumstances, conditions relating to noise emanating from the premises may also be appropriate to address any disturbance anticipated as customers enter and leave.
- 2.20 Measures to control light pollution will also require careful thought. Bright lighting outside premises which is considered appropriate to prevent crime and disorder may itself give rise to light pollution for some neighbours. Applicants, licensing authorities and responsible authorities will need to balance these issues.
- 2.21 Beyond the immediate area surrounding the premises, these are matters for the personal responsibility of individuals under the law. An individual who engages in antisocial behaviour is accountable in their own right. However, it would be perfectly reasonable for a licensing authority to impose a condition, following relevant representations, that requires the licence holder or club to place signs at the exits from the building encouraging

patrons to be quiet until they leave the area, or that, if they wish to smoke, to do so at designated places on the premises instead of outside, and to respect the rights of people living nearby to a peaceful night.

Protection of children from harm

- 2.22 The protection of children from harm includes the protection of children from moral, psychological and physical harm. This includes not only protecting children from the harms associated directly with alcohol consumption but also wider harms such as exposure to strong language and sexual expletives (for example, in the context of exposure to certain films or adult entertainment). Licensing authorities must also consider the need to protect children from sexual exploitation when undertaking licensing functions.
- 2.23 The Government believes that it is completely unacceptable to sell alcohol to children. Conditions relating to the access of children where alcohol is sold and which are appropriate to protect them from harm should be carefully considered. Moreover, conditions restricting the access of children to premises should be strongly considered in circumstances where:
- adult entertainment is provided;
- a member or members of the current management have been convicted for serving alcohol to minors or with a reputation for allowing underage drinking (other than in the context of the exemption in the 2003 Act relating to 16 and 17 year olds consuming beer, wine and cider when accompanied by an adult during a table meal);
- it is known that unaccompanied children have been allowed access;
- there is a known association with drug taking or dealing; or
- in some cases, the premises are used exclusively or primarily for the sale of alcohol for consumption on the premises.
- 2.24 It is also possible that activities, such as adult entertainment, may take place at certain times on premises but not at other times. For example, premises may operate as a café bar during the day providing meals for families but also provide entertainment with a sexual content after 8.00pm. It is not possible to give an exhaustive list of what amounts to entertainment or services of an adult or sexual nature. Applicants, responsible authorities and licensing authorities will need to consider this point carefully. This would broadly include topless bar staff, striptease, lap-, table- or pole-dancing, performances involving feigned violence or horrific incidents, feigned or actual sexual acts or fetishism, or entertainment involving strong and offensive language.
- 2.25 Applicants must be clear in their operating schedules about the activities and times at
- which the events would take place to help determine when it is not appropriate for children to enter the premises. Consideration should also be given to the proximity of premises to schools and youth clubs so that applicants take appropriate steps to ensure that advertising relating to their premises, or relating to events at their premises, is not displayed at a time when children are likely to be near the premises.
- 2.26 Licensing authorities and responsible authorities should expect applicants, when preparing an operating schedule or club operating schedule, to set out the steps to be taken to protect children from harm when on the premises.
- 2.27 Conditions, where they are appropriate, should reflect the licensable activities taking place on the premises. In addition to the mandatory condition regarding age verification, other conditions relating to the protection of children from harm can include:
- restrictions on the hours when children may be present;

- restrictions or exclusions on the presence of children under certain ages when particular specified activities are taking place;
- restrictions on the parts of the premises to which children may have access;
- age restrictions (below 18);
- restrictions or exclusions when certain activities are taking place;
- requirements for an accompanying adult (including for example, a combination of requirements which provide that children under a particular age must be accompanied by an adult); and
- full exclusion of people under 18 from the premises when any licensable activities are taking place.
- 2.28 Please see also Chapter 10 for details about the Licensing Act 2003 (Mandatory Licensing Conditions) Order 2010.
- 2.29 Licensing authorities should give considerable weight to representations about child protection matters. In addition to the responsible authority whose functions relate directly to child protection, the Director of Public Health may also have access to relevant evidence to inform such representations. These representations may include, amongst other things, the use of health data about the harms that alcohol can cause to underage drinkers. Where a responsible authority, or other person, presents evidence to the licensing authority linking specific premises with harms to children (such as ambulance data or emergency department attendances by persons under 18 years old with alcohol-related illnesses or injuries) this evidence should be considered, and the licensing authority should also consider what action is appropriate to ensure this licensing objective is effectively enforced. In relation to applications for the grant of a licence in areas where evidence is presented on high levels of alcohol-related harms in persons aged under 18, it is recommended that the licensing authority considers what conditions may be appropriate to ensure that this objective is promoted effectively.
- 2.30 The 2003 Act provides that, where a premises licence or club premises certificate authorises the exhibition of a film, it must include a condition requiring the admission of children to films to be restricted in accordance with recommendations given either by a body designated under section 4 of the Video Recordings Act 1984 specified in the licence (the British Board of Film Classification is currently the only body which has been so designated) or by the licensing authority itself. Further details are given in Chapter 10.
- 2.31 Theatres may present a range of diverse activities and entertainment including, for example, variety shows incorporating adult entertainment. It is appropriate in these cases for a licensing authority to consider restricting the admission of children in such circumstances. Entertainments may also be presented at theatres specifically for children. It will be appropriate to consider whether a condition should be attached to a premises licence or club premises certificate which requires the presence of a sufficient number of adult staff on the premises to ensure the wellbeing of the children during any emergency.

3. Licensable activities

8. Applications for premises licences

8.2 Section 13 of the 2003 Act defines the parties holding important roles in the context of applications, inspection, monitoring and reviews of premises licences.

Authorised persons

- 8.3 The first group –"authorised persons" are bodies empowered by the 2003 Act to carry out inspection and enforcement roles. The police and immigration officers are not included because they are separately empowered by the 2003 Act to carry out their duties.
- 8.4 For all premises, the authorised persons include:
- officers of the licensing authority;
- fire inspectors;
- inspectors with responsibility in the licensing authority's area for the enforcement of the Health and Safety at Work etc Act 1974;
- officers of the local authority exercising environmental health functions 8.5 Local authority officers will most commonly have responsibility for the enforcement of health and safety legislation, but the Health and Safety Executive is responsible for certain premises. In relation to vessels, authorised persons also include an inspector or a surveyor of ships appointed under section 256 of the Merchant Shipping Act 1995. These would normally be officers acting on behalf of the Maritime and Coastguard Agency. The Secretary of State may prescribe other authorised persons by means of regulations, but has not currently prescribed any additional bodies. If any are prescribed, details will be made available on the GOV.UK website.
- 8.6 Where an immigration officer has reason to believe that any premises are being used for a licensable activity, the officer may enter the premises with a view to seeing whether an offence under any of the Immigration Acts is being committed in connection with the licensable activity.

Responsible authorities

- 8.7 The second group –"responsible authorities" are public bodies that must be fully notified of applications and that are entitled to make representations to the licensing authority in relation to the application for the grant, variation or review of a premises licence. These representations must still be considered 'relevant' by the licensing authority and relate to one or more of the licensing objectives. For all premises, responsible authorities include:
- the relevant licensing authority and any other licensing authority in whose area part of the premises is situated;
- the chief officer of police;
- the local fire and rescue authority;
- the relevant enforcing authority under the Health and Safety at Work etc Act 1974;
- the local authority with responsibility for environmental health;
- the local planning authority;
- a body that represents those who are responsible for, or interested in, matters relating to the protection of children from harm;
- each local authority's Director of Public Health (DPH) in England and Local Health Boards (in Wales);
- the local weights and measures authority (trading standards); and
- Home Office Immigration Enforcement (on behalf of the Secretary of State).

8.8 The licensing authority should indicate in its statement of licensing policy which body it recognises to be competent to advise it on the protection of children from harm. This may be the local authority social services department, the Local Safeguarding Children Board or another competent body. This is important as applications for premises licences have to be copied to the responsible authorities in order for them to make any representations they think are relevant.

..

Other persons

8.13 As well as responsible authorities, any other person can play a role in a number of licensing processes under the 2003 Act. This includes any individual, body or business entitled to make representations to licensing authorities in relation to applications for the grant, variation, minor variation or review of premises licences and club premises certificates, regardless of their geographic proximity to the premises. In addition, these persons may themselves seek a review of a premises licence. Any representations made by these persons must be 'relevant', in that the representation relates to one or more of the licensing objectives. It must also not be considered by the licensing authority to be frivolous or vexatious. In the case of applications for reviews, there is an additional requirement that the grounds for the review should not be considered by the licensing authority to be repetitious. Chapter 9 of this guidance (paragraphs 9.4 to 9.10) provides more detail on the definition of relevant, frivolous and vexatious representations.

8.14 While any of these persons may act in their own right, they may also request that a representative makes the representation to the licensing authority on their behalf. A representative may include a legal representative, a friend, a Member of Parliament, a Member of the Welsh Government, or a local ward or parish councillor who can all act in such a capacity.

...

Steps to promote the licensing objectives

8.41 In completing an operating schedule, applicants are expected to have regard to the statement of licensing policy for their area. They must also be aware of the expectations of the licensing authority and the responsible authorities as to the steps that are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives, and to demonstrate knowledge of their local area when describing the steps they propose to take to promote the licensing objectives. Licensing authorities and responsible authorities are expected to publish information about what is meant by the promotion of the licensing objectives and to ensure that applicants can readily access advice about these matters. However, applicants are also expected to undertake their own enquiries about the area in which the premises are situated to inform the content of the application.

- 8.42 Applicants are, in particular, expected to obtain sufficient information to enable them to demonstrate, when setting out the steps they propose to take to promote the licensing objectives, that they understand:
- the layout of the local area and physical environment including crime and disorder hotspots, proximity to residential premises and proximity to areas where children may congregate;
- any risk posed to the local area by the applicants' proposed licensable activities; and
- any local initiatives (for example, local crime reduction initiatives or voluntary schemes including local taximarshalling schemes, street pastors and other schemes) which may help to mitigate potential risks.
- 8.43 Applicants are expected to include positive proposals in their application on how they will manage any potential risks. Where specific policies apply in the area (for example, a cumulative impact policy), applicants are

also expected to demonstrate an understanding of how the policy impacts on their application; any measures they will take to mitigate the impact; and why they consider the application should be an exception to the policy.

8.44 It is expected that enquiries about the locality will assist applicants when determining the steps that are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. For example, premises with close proximity to residential premises should consider what effect this will have on their smoking, noise management and dispersal policies to ensure the promotion of the public nuisance objective. Applicants must consider all factors which may be relevant to the promotion of the licensing objectives, and where there are no known concerns, acknowledge this in their application.

8.45 The majority of information which applicants will require should be available in the licensing policy statement in the area. Other publicly available sources which may be of use to applicants include:

- the Crime Mapping website;
- Neighbourhood Statistics websites;
- websites or publications by local responsible authorities;
- websites or publications by local voluntary schemes and initiatives; and
- on-line mapping tools.
- 8.46 While applicants are not required to seek the views of responsible authorities before formally submitting their application, they may find them to be a useful source of expert advice on local issues that should be taken into consideration when making an application. Licensing authorities may wish to encourage co-operation between applicants, responsible authorities and, where relevant, local residents and businesses before applications are submitted in order to minimise the scope for disputes to arise.
- 8.47 Applicants are expected to provide licensing authorities with sufficient information in this section to determine the extent to which their proposed steps are appropriate to promote the licensing objectives in the local area. Applications must not be based on providing a set of standard conditions to promote the licensing objectives and applicants are expected to make it clear why the steps they are proposing are appropriate for the premises.
- 8.48 All parties are expected to work together in partnership to ensure that the licensing objectives are promoted collectively. Where there are no disputes, the steps that applicants propose to take to promote the licensing objectives, as set out in the operating schedule, will very often translate directly into conditions that will be attached to premises licences with the minimum of fuss.
- 8.49 For some premises, it is possible that no measures will be appropriate to promote one or more of the licensing objectives, for example, because they are adequately covered by other existing legislation. It is however important that all operating schedules should be precise and clear about the measures that are proposed to promote each of the licensing objectives.
- 9. Determining applications

General

9.1 When a licensing authority receives an application for a new premises licence or an application to vary an existing premises licence, it must determine whether the application has been made in accordance with section 17 of the 2003 Act, and in accordance with regulations made under sections 17(3) to (6), 34, 42, 54 and 55 of the 2003 Act. It must similarly determine applications for the grant of club premises certificates made in accordance with section 71 of the 2003 Act, and in accordance with regulations made under sections 71(4) to (7), 84, 91 and

92 of the 2003 Act. This means that the licensing authority must consider among other things whether the application has been properly advertised in accordance with those regulations.

Where no representations are made

9.2 A hearing is not required where an application has been properly made and no responsible authority or other person has made a relevant representation or where representations are made and subsequently withdrawn. In these cases, the licensing authority must grant the application in the terms sought, subject only to conditions which are consistent with the operating schedule and relevant mandatory conditions under the 2003 Act. This should be undertaken as a simple administrative process by the licensing authority's officials who should replicate the proposals contained in the operating schedule to promote the licensing objectives in the form of clear and enforceable licence conditions. Licensing authorities should not hold hearings for uncontested applications, for example in situations where representations have been made and conditions have subsequently been agreed.

Where representations are made

9.3 Where a representation concerning the licensing objectives is made by a responsible authority about a proposed operating schedule and it is relevant (see paragraphs 9.4 to 9.10 below), the licensing authority's discretion will be engaged. It will also be engaged if another person makes relevant representations to the licensing authority, which are also not frivolous or vexatious (see paragraphs 9.4 to 9.10 below). Relevant representations can be made in opposition to, or in support of, an application and can be made by any individual, body or business that has grounds to do so.

Relevant, vexatious and frivolous representations

- 9.4 A representation is "relevant" if it relates to the likely effect of the grant of the licence on the promotion of at least one of the licensing objectives. For example, a representation from a local businessperson about the commercial damage caused by competition from new licensed premises would not be relevant. On the other hand, a representation by a businessperson that nuisance caused by new premises would deter customers from entering the local area, and the steps proposed by the applicant to prevent that nuisance were inadequate, would be relevant. In other words, representations should relate to the impact of licensable activities carried on from premises on the objectives. For representations in relation to variations to be relevant, they should be confined to the subject matter of the variation. There is no requirement for a responsible authority or other person to produce a recorded history of problems at premises to support their representations, and in fact this would not be possible for new premises.
- 9.5 It is for the licensing authority to determine whether a representation (other than a representation from responsible authority) is frivolous or vexatious on the basis of what might ordinarily be considered to be vexatious or frivolous. A representation may be considered to be vexatious if it appears to be intended to cause aggravation or annoyance, whether to a competitor or other person, without reasonable cause or justification. Vexatious circumstances may arise because of disputes between rival businesses and local knowledge will therefore be invaluable in considering such matters. Licensing authorities can consider the main effect of the representation, and whether any inconvenience or expense caused by it could reasonably be considered to be proportionate.
- 9.6 Frivolous representations would be essentially categorised by a lack of seriousness. Frivolous representations would concern issues which, at most, are minor and in relation to which no remedial steps would be warranted or proportionate.
- 9.7 Any person who is aggrieved by a rejection of their representations on either of these grounds may lodge a complaint through the local authority's corporate complaints procedure. A person may also challenge the authority's decision by way of judicial review.

- 9.8 Licensing authorities should not take decisions about whether representations are frivolous, vexatious or relevant to the licensing objectives on the basis of any political judgement. This may be difficult for councillors who receive complaints from residents within their own wards. If consideration is not to be delegated, contrary to the recommendation in this Guidance, an assessment should be prepared by officials for consideration by the sub-committee before any decision is taken that necessitates a hearing. Any councillor who considers that their own interests are such that they are unable to consider the matter independently should disqualify themselves.
- 9.9 It is recommended that, in borderline cases, the benefit of the doubt about any aspect of a representation should be given to the person making that representation. The subsequent hearing would then provide an opportunity for the person or body making the representation to amplify and clarify it.
- 9.10 Licensing authorities should consider providing advice on their websites about how any person can make representations to them.

The role of responsible authorities

- 9.11 Responsible authorities under the 2003 Act are automatically notified of all new applications. While all responsible authorities may make representations regarding applications for licences and club premises certificates and full variation applications, it is the responsibility of each responsible authority to determine when they have appropriate grounds to do so.
- 9.12 Each responsible authority will be an expert in their respective field, and in some cases it is likely that a particular responsible authority will be the licensing authority's main source of advice in relation to a particular licensing objective. For example, the police have a key role in managing the night-time economy and should have good working relationships with those operating in their local area. The police should usually therefore be the licensing authority's main source of advice on matters relating to the promotion of the crime and disorder licensing objective. However, any responsible authority under the 2003 Act may make representations with regard to any of the licensing objectives if they have evidence to support such representations. Licensing authorities must therefore consider all relevant representations from responsible authorities carefully, even where the reason for a particular responsible authority's interest or expertise in the promotion of a particular objective may not be immediately apparent. However, it remains incumbent on all responsible authorities to ensure that their representations can withstand the scrutiny to which they would be subject at a hearing.

Licensing authorities acting as responsible authorities

- 9.13 Licensing authorities are included in the list of responsible authorities. A similar framework exists in the Gambling Act 2005. The 2003 Act does not require responsible authorities to make representations about applications for the grant of premises licences or to take any other steps in respect of different licensing processes. It is, therefore, for the licensing authority to determine when it considers it appropriate to act in its capacity as a responsible authority; the licensing authority should make this decision in accordance with its duties under section 4 of the 2003 Act.
- 9.14 Licensing authorities are not expected to act as responsible authorities on behalf of other parties (for example, local residents, local councillors or community groups) although there are occasions where the authority may decide to do so. Such parties can make relevant representations to the licensing authority in their own right, and it is reasonable for the licensing authority to expect them to make representations themselves where they are reasonably able to do so. However, if these parties have failed to take action and the licensing authority is aware of relevant grounds to make a representation, it may choose to act in its capacity as responsible authority.
- 9.15 It is also reasonable for licensing authorities to expect that other responsible authorities should intervene where the basis for the intervention falls within the remit of that other responsible authority. For example, the police should make representations where the representations are based on concerns about crime and disorder.

Likewise, it is reasonable to expect the local authority exercising environmental health functions to make representations where there are concerns about noise nuisance. Each responsible authority has equal standing under the 2003 Act and may act independently without waiting for representations from any other responsible authority.

9.16 The 2003 Act enables licensing authorities to act as responsible authorities as a means of early intervention; they may do so where they consider it appropriate without having to wait for representations from other responsible authorities. For example, the licensing authority may (in a case where it has applied a cumulative impact policy) consider that granting a new licence application will add to the cumulative impact of licensed premises in its area and therefore decide to make representations to that effect, without waiting for any other person to do so.

9.17 In cases where a licensing authority is also acting as responsible authority in relation to the same process, it is important to achieve a separation of responsibilities within the authority to ensure procedural fairness and eliminate conflicts of interest. In such cases licensing determinations will be made by the licensing committee or sub committee comprising elected members of the authority (although they are advised by a licensing officer). Therefore, a separation is achieved by allocating distinct functions (i.e. those of licensing authority and responsible authority) to different officials within the authority.

9.18 In these cases, licensing authorities should allocate the different responsibilities to different licensing officers or other officers within the local authority to ensure a proper separation of responsibilities. The officer advising the licensing committee (i.e. the authority acting in its capacity as the licensing authority) must be a different person from the officer who is acting for the responsible authority. The officer acting for the responsible authority should not be involved in the licensing decision process and should not discuss the merits of the case with those involved in making the determination by the licensing authority. For example, discussion should not take place between the officer acting as responsible authority and the officer handling the licence application regarding the merits of the case. Communication between these officers in relation to the case should remain professional and consistent with communication with other responsible authorities. Representations, subject to limited exceptions, must be made in writing. It is for the licensing authority to determine how the separate roles are divided to ensure an appropriate separation of responsibilities. This approach may not be appropriate for all licensing authorities and many authorities may already have processes in place to effectively achieve the same outcome.

9.19 Smaller licensing authorities, where such a separation of responsibilities is more difficult, may wish to involve officials from outside the licensing department to ensure a separation of responsibilities. However, these officials should still be officials employed by the authority.

•••

Hearings

9.31 The Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005 governing hearings may be found on the www.legislation.gov.uk website. If the licensing authority decides that representations are relevant, it must hold a hearing to consider them. The need for a hearing can only be avoided with the agreement of the licensing authority, where the applicant and all of the persons who made relevant representations have given notice to the authority that they consider a hearing to be unnecessary. Where this is the case and the authority agrees that a hearing is unnecessary, it must forthwith give notice to the parties that the hearing has been dispensed with. Notwithstanding those regulatory provisions, in cases where the licensing authority believes that a hearing is still necessary, it is recommended that the authority should, as soon as possible, provide the parties with reasons in writing for the need to hold the hearing. In cases where only 'positive' representations are received, without qualifications, the licensing authority should consider whether a hearing is required. To this end, it may wish to

notify the persons who made representations and give them the opportunity to withdraw those representations. This would need to be done in sufficient time before the hearing to ensure that parties were not put to unnecessary inconvenience.

- 9.32 Responsible authorities should try to conclude any discussions with the applicant in good time before the hearing. The 2005 Hearings Regulations permit licensing authorities to extend a time limit provided for by those Regulations for a specified period where it considers this to be necessary in the public interest. For example, if the application is amended at the last moment, the licensing committee should consider giving other persons time to address the revised application before the hearing commences. Where the authority has extended a time limit it must forthwith give a notice to the parties involved stating the period of the extension and the reasons for it.
- 9.33 The 2005 Hearings Regulations require that representations must be withdrawn 24 hours before the first day of any hearing. If they are withdrawn after this time, the hearing must proceed and the representations may be withdrawn orally at that hearing. However, where discussions between an applicant and those making representations are taking place and it is likely that all parties are on the point of reaching agreement, the licensing authority may wish to use the power given within the hearings regulations to extend time limits, if it considers this to be in the public interest.
- 9.34 Applicants should be encouraged to contact responsible authorities and others, such as local residents, who may be affected by the application before formulating their applications so that the mediation process may begin before the statutory time limits come into effect after submission of an application. The hearing process must meet the requirements of regulations made under the 2003 Act. Where matters arise which are not covered by the regulations, licensing authorities may make arrangements as they see fit as long as they are lawful.
- 9.35 There is no requirement in the 2003 Act for responsible authorities that have made representations to attend, but it is generally good practice and assists committees in reaching more informed decisions. Where several responsible authorities within a local authority have made representations on an application, a single local authority officer may represent them at the hearing if the responsible authorities and the licensing authority agree. This local authority officer representing other responsible authorities may be a licensing officer, but only if this licensing officer is acting as a responsible authority on behalf of the licensing authority and has had no role in the licensing determination process. This is to ensure that the responsible authorities are represented by an independent officer separate from the licensing determination process.
- 9.36 As noted in paragraphs 9.13 to 9.19 above, where the licensing officer is acting as a responsible authority the relevant steps should be followed to ensure that this individual has no role in the decision making process regarding the licensing determination.
- 9.37 As a matter of practice, licensing authorities should seek to focus the hearing on the steps considered appropriate to promote the particular licensing objective or objectives that have given rise to the specific representation and avoid straying into undisputed areas. A responsible authority or other person may choose to rely on their written representation. They may not add further representations to those disclosed to the applicant prior to the hearing, but they may expand on their existing representation and should be allowed sufficient time to do so, within reasonable and practicable limits.
- 9.38 In determining the application with a view to promoting the licensing objectives in the overall interests of the local community, the licensing authority must give appropriate weight to:
- the steps that are appropriate to promote the licensing objectives;
- the representations (including supporting information) presented by all the parties;
- this Guidance;

its own statement of licensing policy.

9.39 The licensing authority should give its decision within five working days of the conclusion of the hearing (or immediately in certain specified cases) and provide reasons to support it. This will be important if there is an appeal by any of the parties. Notification of a decision must be accompanied by information on the right of the party to appeal. After considering all the relevant issues, the licensing authority may grant the application subject to such conditions that are consistent with the operating schedule. Any conditions imposed must be appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives; there is no power for the licensing authority to attach a condition that is merely aspirational. For example, conditions may not be attached which relate solely to the health of customers rather than their direct physical safety. Any conditions added to the licence must be those imposed at the hearing or those agreed when a hearing has not been necessary.

9.40 Alternatively, the licensing authority may refuse the application on the grounds that this is appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. It may also refuse to specify a designated premises supervisor and/or only allow certain requested licensable activities. In the interests of transparency, the licensing authority should publish hearings procedures in full on its website to ensure that those involved have the most current information.

9.41 In the context of variations or minor variations, which may involve structural alteration to or change of use of a building, the decision of the licensing authority will not exempt an applicant from the need to apply for building control approval, planning permission or both of these where appropriate.

Determining actions that are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives

- 9.42 Licensing authorities are best placed to determine what actions are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives in their areas. All licensing determinations should be considered on a case-by-case basis. They should take into account any representations or objections that have been received from responsible authorities or other persons, and representations made by the applicant or premises user as the case may be.
- 9.43 The authority's determination should be evidence-based, justified as being appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives and proportionate to what it is intended to achieve.
- 9.44 Determination of whether an action or step is appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives requires an assessment of what action or step would be suitable to achieve that end. While this does not therefore require a licensing authority to decide that no lesser step will achieve the aim, the authority should aim to consider the potential burden that the condition would impose on the premises licence holder (such as the financial burden due to restrictions on licensable activities) as well as the potential benefit in terms of the promotion of the licensing objectives. However, it is imperative that the authority ensures that the factors which form the basis of its determination are limited to consideration of the promotion of the objectives and nothing outside those parameters. As with the consideration of licence variations, the licensing authority should consider wider issues such as other conditions already in place to mitigate potential negative impact on the promotion of the licensing objectives and the track record of the business. Further advice on determining what is appropriate when imposing conditions on a licence or certificate is provided in Chapter 10. The licensing authority is expected to come to its determination based on an assessment of the evidence on both the risks and benefits either for or against making the determination.

Considering cases where licensing and planning applications are made simultaneously

9.45 Where businesses have indicated, when applying for a licence under the 2003 Act, that they have also applied for planning permission or that they intend to do so, licensing committees and officers should consider discussion with their planning counterparts prior to determination with the aim of agreeing mutually acceptable operating hours and scheme designs.

10. Conditions attached to premises licences and club premises certificates

General

- 10.1 This chapter provides further guidance in relation to conditions attached to premises licences and club premises certificates. General principles on licence conditions are set out in Chapter 1 (see paragraph 1.16).
- 10.2 Conditions include any limitations or restrictions attached to a licence or certificate and essentially are the steps or actions that the holder of the premises licence or the club premises certificate will be required to take or refrain from taking in relation to the carrying on of licensable activities at the premises in question. Failure to comply with any condition attached to a licence or certificate is a criminal offence, which on conviction is punishable by an unlimited fine or up to six months' imprisonment. The courts have made clear that it is particularly important that conditions which are imprecise or difficult for a licence holder to observe should be avoided.
- 10.3 There are three types of condition that may be attached to a licence or certificate: proposed, imposed and mandatory. Each of these categories is described in more detail below.

Proposed conditions

- 10.4 The conditions that are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives should emerge initially from the risk assessment carried out by a prospective licence or certificate holder, which they should carry out before making their application for a premises licence or club premises certificate. This would be translated into the steps recorded in the operating schedule or club operating schedule, which must also set out the proposed hours during which licensable activities will be conducted and any other hours during which the premises will be open to the public.
- 10.5 It is not acceptable for licensing authorities to simply replicate the wording from an applicant's operating schedule. A condition should be interpreted in accordance with the applicant's intention.

Consistency with steps described in operating schedule

- 10.6 The 2003 Act provides that where an operating schedule or club operating schedule has been submitted with an application and there have been no relevant representations made by responsible authorities or any other person, the licence or certificate must be granted subject only to such conditions as are consistent with the schedule accompanying the application and any mandatory conditions required under the 2003 Act.
- 10.7 Consistency means that the effect of the condition should be substantially the same as that intended by the terms of the operating schedule. If conditions are broken, this may lead to a criminal prosecution or an application for a review and it is extremely important therefore that they should be expressed on the licence or certificate in unequivocal and unambiguous terms. The duty imposed by conditions on the licence holder or club must be clear to the licence holder, club, enforcement officers and the courts.

Imposed conditions

- 10.8 The licensing authority may not impose any conditions unless its discretion has been exercised following receipt of relevant representations and it is satisfied as a result of a hearing (unless all parties agree a hearing is not necessary) that it is appropriate to impose conditions to promote one or more of the four licensing objectives. In order to promote the crime prevention licensing objective conditions may be included that are aimed at preventing illegal working in licensed premises. This provision also applies to minor variations.
- 10.9 It is possible that in some cases no additional conditions will be appropriate to promote the licensing objectives.

Proportionality

10.10 The 2003 Act requires that licensing conditions should be tailored to the size, type, location and characteristics and activities taking place at the premises concerned. Conditions should be determined on a case-by-case basis and standardised conditions which ignore these individual aspects should be avoided. For example, conditions should not be used to implement a general policy in a given area such as the use of CCTV, polycarbonate drinking vessels or identity scanners where they would not be appropriate to the specific premises. Conditions that are considered appropriate for the prevention of illegal working in premises licensed to sell alcohol or late night refreshment might include requiring a premises licence holder to undertake right to work checks on all staff employed at the licensed premises or requiring that a copy of any document checked as part of a right to work check is retained at the licensed premises. Licensing authorities and other responsible authorities should be alive to the indirect costs that can arise because of conditions. These could be a deterrent to holding events that are valuable to the community or for the funding of good and important causes. Licensing authorities should therefore ensure that any conditions they impose are only those which are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives.

Hours of trading

10.13 The Government acknowledges that different licensing strategies may be appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives in different areas. The 2003 Act gives the licensing authority power to make decisions about the hours during which premises can conduct licensable activities as part of the implementation of its licensing policy statement. Licensing authorities are best placed to make decisions about appropriate opening hours in their areas based on their local knowledge and in consultation with responsible authorities. However, licensing authorities must always consider each application and must not impose predetermined licensed opening hours, without giving individual consideration to the merits of each application.

10.14 Where there are objections to an application to extend the hours during which licensable activities are to be carried on and the licensing authority determines that this would undermine the licensing objectives, it may reject the application or grant it with appropriate conditions and/or different hours from those requested.

Mandatory conditions in relation to the supply of alcohol

10.25 The 2003 Act provides for the following mandatory conditions to be included in every licence and/or club premises certificate in the circumstances specified.

Arrangements for the mandatory licence conditions

10.36 The mandatory conditions made under sections 19A and 73B of the 2003 Act (the conditions governing irresponsible promotions, dispensing alcohol directly into the mouth, provision of free tap water, age verification, small measures and the prohibition on sales of alcohol below the permitted price) do not have to be physically included in the licence or certificate but nonetheless will apply to every licence and certificate authorising the sale and supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises. The mandatory conditions set out in section 19 of the 2003 Act (the requirement for a DPS and for all sales to be made or authorised by a personal licence holder) do, however, have to be physically included in the licence. The mandatory licence conditions do not apply to activities (including the supply of alcohol) authorised by a temporary event notice.

Irresponsible promotions

10.39 Under this condition, the "responsible person" (defined in the 2003 Act as the holder of a premises licence, designated premises supervisor, a person aged 18 or over who is authorised to allow the sale or supply of alcohol by an under 18 or a member or officer of a club present on the club premises who can oversee the supply of alcohol) should be able to demonstrate that they have ensured that staff do not carry out, arrange or participate

in any irresponsible promotions. An irresponsible promotion is one that fits one of the descriptions below (or is substantially similar), is carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises. The aim of the condition is to prohibit or restrict promotions which encourage people to drink more than they might ordinarily do and in a manner which undermines the licensing objectives.

Free potable water

10.45 The responsible person (see paragraph 10.39) must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available on the premises. What is meant by reasonably available is a question of fact; for example, it would not be reasonable to expect free tap water to be available in premises for which the water supply had temporarily been lost because of a broken mains water supply. However, it may be reasonable to expect bottled water to be provided in such circumstances.

Age verification

10.46 The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy applies to the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol. This must as a minimum require individuals who appear to the responsible person (see paragraph 10.39) to be under the age of 18 years of age to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth, and either a holographic mark or ultraviolet feature. The Home Office encourages licensed premises to accept cards bearing the Proof of Age Standards Scheme (PASS) hologram as their preferred proof of age, while acknowledging that many other forms of identification meet the requirements of the mandatory condition.

10.47 The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that staff (in particular, staff who are involved in the supply of alcohol) are made aware of the existence and content of the age verification policy which applies by the premises.

10.48 The designated premises supervisor (where there is one) must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy. This means that the DPS has personal responsibility for ensuring that staff are not only aware of, but are also applying, the age verification policy.

10.49 It is acceptable, and indeed encouraged, for premises to have an age verification policy which requires individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under an age greater than 18 to produce such identification on request. For example, if premises have a policy that requires any individual that appears to be under the age of 21 to produce identification that meets the criteria listed above, this is perfectly acceptable under the mandatory code.

10.50 Licence holders should consider carefully what steps they are required to take to comply with the age verification requirements under the 2003 Act in relation to sales of alcohol made remotely. These include sales made online, by telephone and mail order sales, and alcohol delivery services. Each of these sales must comply with the requirements of the 2003 Act. The mandatory condition requires that age verification takes place before a person is served alcohol. Where alcohol is sold remotely (for example, online) or through a telephone transaction, the sale is made at this point but the alcohol is not actually served until it is delivered to the customer. Age verification measures (for example, online age verification) should be used to ensure that alcohol is not sold to any person under the age of 18. However, licence holders should also consider carefully what steps are appropriate to ensure that age verification takes place before the alcohol is served (i.e. physically delivered) to the customer to be satisfied that the customer is aged 18 or over. It is, therefore, the responsibility of the person serving or delivering the alcohol to ensure that age verification has taken place and that photo ID has been checked if the person appears to be less than 18 years of age.

11. Reviews

The review process

- 11.1 The proceedings set out in the 2003 Act for reviewing premises licences and club premises certificates represent a key protection for the community where problems associated with the licensing objectives occur after the grant or variation of a premises licence or club premises certificate.
- 11.2 At any stage, following the grant of a premises licence or club premises certificate, a responsible authority, or any other person, may ask the licensing authority to review the licence or certificate because of a matter arising at the premises in connection with any of the four licensing objectives.
- 11.3 An application for review may be made electronically, provided that the licensing authority agrees and the applicant submits a subsequent hard copy of the application, if the licensing authority requires one. The licensing authority may also agree in advance that the application need not be given in hard copy. However, these applications are outside the formal electronic application process and may not be submitted via GOV.UK or the licensing authority's electronic facility.
- 11.4 In addition, the licensing authority must review a licence if the premises to which it relates was made the subject of a closure order by the police based on nuisance or disorder and the magistrates' court has sent the authority the relevant notice of its determination, or if the police have made an application for summary review on the basis that premises are associated with serious crime and/or disorder.
- 11.5 Any responsible authority under the 2003 Act may apply for a review of a premises licence or club premises certificate. Therefore, the relevant licensing authority may apply for a review if it is concerned about licensed activities at premises and wants to intervene early without waiting for representations from other persons. However, it is not expected that licensing authorities should normally act as responsible authorities in applying for reviews on behalf of other persons, such as local residents or community groups. These individuals or groups are entitled to apply for a review for a licence or certificate in their own right if they have grounds to do so. It is also reasonable for licensing authorities to expect other responsible authorities to intervene where the basis for the intervention falls within the remit of that other authority. For example, the police should take appropriate steps where the basis for the review is concern about crime and disorder or the sexual exploitation of children. Likewise, where there are concerns about noise nuisance, it is reasonable to expect the local authority exercising environmental health functions for the area in which the premises are situated to make the application for review.
- 11.6 Where the relevant licensing authority does act as a responsible authority and applies for a review, it is important that a separation of responsibilities is still achieved in this process to ensure procedural fairness and eliminate conflicts of interest. As outlined previously in Chapter 9 of this Guidance, the distinct functions of acting as licensing authority and responsible authority should be exercised by different officials to ensure a separation of responsibilities. Further information on how licensing authorities should achieve this separation of responsibilities can be found in Chapter 9, paragraphs 9.13 to 9.19 of this Guidance.
- 11.7 In every case, any application for a review must relate to particular premises in respect of which there is a premises licence or club premises certificate and must be relevant to the promotion of one or more of the licensing objectives. Following the grant or variation of a licence or certificate, a complaint regarding a general issue in the local area relating to the licensing objectives, such as a general (crime and disorder) situation in a town centre, should generally not be regarded as a relevant representation unless it can be positively tied or linked by a causal connection to particular premises, which would allow for a proper review of the licence or certificate. For instance, a geographic cluster of complaints, including along transport routes related to an individual public house and its closing time, could give grounds for a review of an existing licence as well as direct

incidents of crime and disorder around a particular public house.

- 11.8 Where a licensing authority receives a geographic cluster of complaints, the authority may consider whether these issues are the result of the cumulative impact of licensed premises within the area concerned. In such circumstances, the authority may also consider whether it would be appropriate to include a special policy relating to cumulative impact within its licensing policy statement. Further guidance on cumulative impact policies can be found in Chapter 14 of this Guidance.
- 11.9 Representations must be made in writing and may be amplified at the subsequent hearing or may stand in their own right. Additional representations which do not amount to an amplification of the original representation may not be made at the hearing. Representations may be made electronically, provided the licensing authority agrees and the applicant submits a subsequent hard copy, unless the licensing authority waives this requirement.
- 11.10 Where authorised persons and responsible authorities have concerns about problems identified at premises, it is good practice for them to give licence holders early warning of their concerns and the need for improvement, and where possible they should advise the licence or certificate holder of the steps they need to take to address those concerns. A failure by the holder to respond to such warnings is expected to lead to a decision to apply for a review. Co-operation at a local level in promoting the licensing objectives should be encouraged and reviews should not be used to undermine this cooperation.
- 11.11 If the application for a review has been made by a person other than a responsible authority (for example, a local resident, residents' association, local business or trade association), before taking action the licensing authority must first consider whether the complaint being made is relevant, frivolous, vexatious or repetitious. Further guidance on determining whether a representation is frivolous or vexatious can be found in Chapter 9 of this Guidance (paragraphs 9.4 to 9.10).

Repetitious grounds of review

- 11.12 A repetitious ground is one that is identical or substantially similar to:
- a ground for review specified in an earlier application for review made in relation to the same premises licence or certificate which has already been determined; or
- representations considered by the licensing authority when the premises licence or certificate was granted; or
- representations which would have been made when the application for the premises licence was first made and which were excluded then by reason of the prior issue of a provisional statement; and, in addition to the above grounds, a reasonable interval has not elapsed since that earlier review or grant.
- 11.13 Licensing authorities are expected to be aware of the need to prevent attempts to review licences merely as a further means of challenging the grant of the licence following the failure of representations to persuade the licensing authority on an earlier occasion. It is for licensing authorities themselves to judge what should be regarded as a reasonable interval in these circumstances. However, it is recommended that more than one review originating from a person other than a responsible authority in relation to a particular premises should not be permitted within a 12 month period on similar grounds save in compelling circumstances or where it arises following a closure order.
- 11.14 The exclusion of a complaint on the grounds that it is repetitious does not apply to responsible authorities which may make more than one application for a review of a licence or certificate within a 12 month period.
- 11.15 When a licensing authority receives an application for a review from a responsible authority or any other person, or in accordance with the closure procedures described in Part 8 of the 2003 Act (for example, closure

orders), it must arrange a hearing. The arrangements for the hearing must follow the provisions set out in regulations. These regulations are published on the Government's legislation website (www.legislation.gov.uk). It is particularly important that the premises licence holder is made fully aware of any representations made in respect of the premises, any evidence supporting the representations and that the holder or the holder's legal representative has therefore been able to prepare a response.

Powers of a licensing authority on the determination of a review

- 11.16 The 2003 Act provides a range of powers for the licensing authority which it may exercise on determining a review where it considers them appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives.
- 11.17 The licensing authority may decide that the review does not require it to take any further steps appropriate to promoting the licensing objectives. In addition, there is nothing to prevent a licensing authority issuing an informal warning to the licence holder and/or to recommend improvement within a particular period of time. It is expected that licensing authorities will regard such informal warnings as an important mechanism for ensuring that the licensing objectives are effectively promoted and that warnings should be issued in writing to the licence holder.
- 11.18 However, where responsible authorities such as the police or environmental health officers have already issued warnings requiring improvement either orally or in writing that have failed as part of their own stepped approach to address concerns, licensing authorities should not merely repeat that approach and should take this into account when considering what further action is appropriate. Similarly, licensing authorities may take into account any civil immigration penalties which a licence holder has been required to pay for employing an illegal worker.
- 11.19 Where the licensing authority considers that action under its statutory powers is appropriate, it may take any of the following steps:
- modify the conditions of the premises licence (which includes adding new conditions or any alteration or omission of an existing condition), for example, by reducing the hours of opening or by requiring door supervisors at particular times;
- exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the licence, for example, to exclude the performance of live music or playing of recorded music (where it is not within the incidental live and recorded music exemption)10;
- remove the designated premises supervisor, for example, because they consider that the problems are the result of poor management;
- suspend the licence for a period not exceeding three months;
- revoke the licence.
- 11.20 In deciding which of these powers to invoke, it is expected that licensing authorities should so far as possible seek to establish the cause or causes of the concerns that the representations identify. The remedial action taken should generally be directed at these causes and should always be no more than an appropriate and proportionate response to address the causes of concern that instigated the review.
- 11.21 For example, licensing authorities should be alive to the possibility that the removal and replacement of the designated premises supervisor may be sufficient to remedy a problem where the cause of the identified problem directly relates to poor management decisions made by that individual.
- 11.22 Equally, it may emerge that poor management is a direct reflection of poor company practice or policy and the mere removal of the designated premises supervisor may be an inadequate response to the problems presented. Indeed, where subsequent review hearings are generated by representations, it should be rare merely

to remove a succession of designated premises supervisors as this would be a clear indication of deeper problems that impact upon the licensing objectives.

11.23 Licensing authorities should also note that modifications of conditions and exclusions of licensable activities may be imposed either permanently or for a temporary period of up to three months. Temporary changes or suspension of the licence for up to three months could impact on the business holding the licence financially and would only be expected to be pursued as an appropriate means of promoting the licensing objectives or preventing illegal working. So, for instance, a licence could be suspended for a weekend as a means of deterring the holder from allowing the problems that gave rise to the review to happen again. However, it will always be important that any detrimental financial impact that may result from a licensing authority's decision is appropriate and proportionate to the promotion of the licensing objectives and for the prevention of illegal working in licensed premises. But where premises are found to be trading irresponsibly the licensing authority should not hesitate, where appropriate to do so, to take tough action to tackle the problems at the premises and, where other measures are deemed insufficient, to revoke the licence.

..

13. Appeals

General

- 13.3 An appeal has to be commenced by the appellant giving a notice of appeal to the designated officer for the magistrates' court within a period of 21 days beginning with the day on which the appellant was notified by the licensing authority of the decision which is being appealed.
- 13.4 The licensing authority will always be a respondent to the appeal, but in cases where a favourable decision has been made for an applicant, licence holder, club or premises user against the representations of a responsible authority or any other person, or the objections of the chief officer of police, the Home Office (Immigration Enforcement), or local authority exercising environmental health functions, the holder of the premises or personal licence or club premises certificate or the person who gave an interim authority notice or the premises user will also be a respondent to the appeal, and the person who made the relevant representation or gave the objection will be the appellants.
- 13.5 Where an appeal has been made against a decision of the licensing authority, the licensing authority will in all cases be the respondent to the appeal and may call as a witness a responsible authority or any other person who made representations against the application, if it chooses to do so. For this reason, the licensing authority should consider keeping responsible authorities and others informed of developments in relation to appeals to allow them to consider their position. Provided the court considers it appropriate, the licensing authority may also call as witnesses any individual or body that they feel might assist their response to an appeal.
- 13.6 The court, on hearing any appeal, may review the merits of the decision on the facts and consider points of law or address both.

13.7 On determining an appeal, the court may:

- dismiss the appeal;
- substitute for the decision appealed against any other decision which could have been made by the licensing authority; or
- remit the case to the licensing authority to dispose of it in accordance with the direction of the court and make such order as to costs as it thinks fit.

All parties should be aware that the court may make an order for one party to pay another party's costs.

Licensing policy statements and Section 182 guidance

13.8 In hearing an appeal against any decision made by a licensing authority, the magistrates' court will have regard to that licensing authority's statement of licensing policy and this Guidance. However, the court would be entitled to depart from either the statement of licensing policy or this Guidance if it considered it was justified to do so because of the individual circumstances of any case. In other words, while the court will normally consider the matter as if it were "standing in the shoes" of the licensing authority, it would be entitled to find that the licensing authority should have departed from its own policy or the Guidance because the particular circumstances would have justified such a decision.

13.9 In addition, the court is entitled to disregard any part of a licensing policy statement or this Guidance that it holds to be ultra vires the 2003 Act and therefore unlawful. The normal course for challenging a statement of licensing policy or this Guidance should be by way of judicial review, but where it is submitted to an appellate court that a statement of policy is itself ultra vires the 2003 Act and this has a direct bearing on the case before it, it would be inappropriate for the court, on accepting such a submission, to compound the original error by relying on that part of the statement of licensing policy affected.

Giving reasons for decisions

13.10 It is important that a licensing authority gives comprehensive reasons for its decisions in anticipation of any appeals. Failure to give adequate reasons could itself give rise to grounds for an appeal. It is particularly important that reasons should also address the extent to which the decision has been made with regard to the licensing authority's statement of policy and this Guidance. Reasons should be promulgated to all the parties of any process which might give rise to an appeal under the terms of the 2003 Act.

14. Statements of licensing policy

General

14.2 Section 5 of the 2003 Act requires a licensing authority to prepare and publish a statement of its licensing policy at least every five years. Such a policy must be published before the authority carries out any function in respect of individual applications and notices made under the terms of the 2003 Act. During the five-year period, the policy must be kept under review and the licensing authority may make any revisions to it as it considers appropriate, for instance in the light of feedback from the local community on whether the licensing objectives are being met. If the licensing authority determines and publishes its policy in this way, a new five-year period commences on the date it is published. Previously, licensing authorities were required to determine their licensing policies for each three-year period. Licensing policies published in respect of the three-year period that began on 7 January 2011 are to be treated as though they apply to a period of five years beginning at that date.

...

Fundamental principles

14.9 All statements of policy should begin by stating the four licensing objectives, which the licensing policy should promote. In determining its policy, a licensing authority must have regard to this Guidance and give appropriate weight to the views of consultees.

14.10 While statements of policy may set out a general approach to making licensing decisions, they must not ignore or be inconsistent with provisions in the 2003 Act. For example, a statement of policy must not undermine the right of any person to apply under the terms of the 2003 Act for a variety of permissions and to have any such application considered on its individual merits.

14.11 Similarly, no statement of policy should override the right of any person to make representations on an application or to seek a review of a licence or certificate where provision has been made for them to do so in the 2003 Act.

14.12 Statements of policies should make clear that:

- licensing is about regulating licensable activities on licensed premises, by qualifying clubs and at temporary events within the terms of the 2003 Act; and
- conditions attached to various authorisations will be focused on matters which are within the control of individual licence holders and others with relevant authorisations, i.e. the premises and its vicinity.
- 14.13 A statement of policy should also make clear that licensing law is not the primary mechanism for the general control of nuisance and anti-social behaviour by individuals once they are away from the licensed premises and, therefore, beyond the direct control of the individual, club or business holding the licence, certificate or authorisation concerned. Nonetheless, it is a key aspect of such control and licensing law will always be part of a holistic approach to the management of the evening and night-time economy in town and city centres.

Licence conditions

- 14.14 Statements of licensing policy should reflect the general principles regarding licence conditions set out in Chapter 1 of this guidance.
- 14.15 Statements of licensing policy should include a firm commitment to avoid attaching conditions that duplicate other regulatory regimes as far as possible. Chapter 10 provides further detail on this issue.

...

Entertainment provision

14.18 Statements of licensing policy should set out the extent to which the licensing authority intends to facilitate a broad range of entertainment provision for enjoyment by a wide cross-section of the public. Statements of licensing policy should address what balance is to be struck between promoting the provision of entertainment and addressing concerns relevant to the licensing objectives. Licensing authorities should be conscious that licensing policy may inadvertently deter live music by imposing indirect costs of a disproportionate nature, for example a blanket policy that any pub providing live music entertainment must have door supervisors.

The need for licensed premises

14.19 There can be confusion about the difference between the "need" for premises and the "cumulative impact" of premises on the licensing objectives, for example, on crime and disorder. "Need" concerns the commercial demand for another pub or restaurant or hotel and is a matter for the planning authority and for the market. This is not a matter for a licensing authority in discharging its licensing functions or for its statement of licensing policy.

The cumulative impact of a concentration of licensed premises

What is cumulative impact?

14.20 The concept of "Cumulative impact" has been described within this guidance and used by licensing authorities within their statements of licensing policy since the commencement of the 2003 Act. 'Cumulative impact assessments' were introduced in the 2003 Act by the Policing and Crime Act 2017, with effect from 6 April 2018. Cumulative impact is the potential impact on the promotion of the licensing objectives of

a number of licensed premises concentrated in one area.

- 14.21 In some areas where the number, type or density of licensed premises, such as those selling alcohol or providing late night refreshment, is high or exceptional, serious problems of nuisance and disorder may arise outside or some distance from those premises. Such problems generally occur as a result of large numbers of drinkers being concentrated in an area, for example when leaving premises at peak times or when queuing at fast food outlets or for public transport.
- 14.22 Queuing in itself may lead to conflict, disorder and anti-social behaviour. Moreover, large concentrations of people may also attract criminal activities such as drug dealing, pick pocketing and street robbery. Local services such as public transport, public lavatory provision and street cleaning may not be able to meet the demand posed by such concentrations of drinkers leading to issues such as street fouling, littering, traffic and public nuisance caused by concentrations of people who cannot be effectively dispersed quickly.
- 14.23 Variable licensing hours may facilitate a more gradual dispersal of customers from premises. However, in some cases, the impact on surrounding areas of the behaviour of the customers of all premises taken together will be greater than the impact of customers of individual premises. These conditions are more likely to arise in town and city centres, but may also arise in other urban centres and the suburbs, for example on smaller high streets with high concentrations of licensed premises.

Cumulative impact assessments

14.24 A cumulative impact assessment (CIA) may be published by a licensing authority to help it to limit the number or types of licence applications granted in areas where there is evidence to show that the number or density of licensed premises in the area is having a cumulative impact and leading to problems which are undermining the licensing objectives. CIAs relate to applications for new premises licences and club premises certificates and applications to vary existing premises licences and club premises certificates in a specified area.

...

Licensing hours

- 14.51 With regard to licensing hours, the Government acknowledges that different licensing approaches may be appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives in different areas. The 2003 Act gives the licensing authority power to make decisions regarding licensed opening hours as part of the implementation of its licensing policy statement and licensing authorities are best placed to make such decisions based on their local knowledge and in consultation with other responsible authorities. However, licensing authorities must always consider each application and must not impose predetermined licensed opening hours, without giving individual consideration to the merits of each application.
- 14.52 Statements of licensing policy should set out the licensing authority's approach regarding licensed opening hours and the strategy it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives in its area. The statement of licensing policy should emphasise the consideration which will be given to the individual merits of an application. The Government recognises that licensed premises make an important contribution to our local communities, and has given councils a range of tools to effectively manage the different pressures that licensed premises can bring. In determining appropriate strategies around licensed opening hours, licensing authorities cannot seek to restrict the activities of licensed premises where it is not appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives to do so.

Planning and building control

14.64 The statement of licensing policy should indicate that planning permission, building control approval and licensing regimes will be properly separated to avoid duplication and inefficiency. The planning and licensing regimes involve consideration of different (albeit related) matters. Licensing committees are not bound by

decisions made by a planning committee, and vice versa. However, as set out in chapter 9, licensing committees and officers should consider discussions with their planning counterparts prior to determination with the aim of agreeing mutually acceptable operating hours and scheme designs.

14.65 There are circumstances when, as a condition of planning permission, a terminal hour has been set for the use of premises for commercial purposes. Where these hours are different to the licensing hours, the applicant must observe the earlier closing time. Premises operating in breach of their planning permission would be liable to prosecution under planning law. Proper integration should be assured by licensing committees, where appropriate, providing regular reports to the planning committee.

Administration, exercise and delegation of functions

14.68 The 2003 Act provides that the functions of the licensing authority (including its determinations) are to be taken or carried out by its licensing committee (except those relating to the making of a statement of licensing policy or where another of its committees has the matter referred to it). The licensing committee may delegate these functions to sub-committees consisting of three members of the committee, or in appropriate cases to officials supporting the licensing authority. Where licensing functions are not automatically transferred to licensing committees, the functions must be carried out by the licensing authority as a whole and not by its executive. Statements of licensing policy should indicate how the licensing authority intends to approach its various functions. Many of the decisions and functions will be purely administrative in nature and statements of licensing policy should underline the principle of delegation in the interests of speed, efficiency and cost-effectiveness.
