## 1. Health Inequality Grants

- 1.1 Gloucestershire County Council allocated a budget of £40,000 to Cheltenham Borough Council in 2014/15 to allocate to local health inequality projects. Cabinet on 11 November 2014 allocated £20,213.50 to four projects. This report sets out how the remaining £19,786.50 will be allocated.
- **1.2** The remaining funds were allocated via a small grants round that went live on 4<sup>th</sup> December 2014 and was publicised via a media release and communications via GAVCA. The closing date was 19<sup>th</sup> January 2015. In total, 6 applications were received totalling nearly £23,000.
- **1.3** On 20 January, an assessment panel comprising the Cabinet Member Healthy Lifestyles, Angela Gilbert from GAVCA and Richard Gibson from the Commissioning Division met to assess the applications and make recommendations to the Cabinet Member The panel made a number of recommendations about the funding that are shown on the attached table – appendix 2.
- **1.4** It is therefore recommended that £18,808.10 of the health inequalities grant be allocated to five projects as set out in the appendix.
