Executive summary	This report sets out urgent licensing changes in order to ensure continuit service delivery during the current COVID- 19 emergency and in advance awaited emergency Government legislation.

	2. Approve the review period of 31 June 2020 as outlined in paragraph 2.2.						

Financial implications	The majority of the policy changes do not have any significant financial implications. The main change that does is the temporarily suspending of new driving and operating licenses. In the period Apr-19 to Jun-19, we completed 25 new licenses at £225 each. Therefore if you assume that we would normally get this number of new licenses in normal times then we would lose £5,625 from this policy. However, due to the movement restrictions currently in place across the UK, it is unlikely that new taxi driving and operating licenses would be requested due to the lack of journeys taking place and therefore lack of profit for taxi drivers. 1. Background

- 1.1 This report sets out urgent licensing changes in order to ensure continuity in service delivery during the current COVID- 19 emergency and in advance of awaited emergency Government legislation.
- 1.2 Since Government restrictions have been imposed, a number of important service delivery areas in licensing have been affected which required a response and change in position to ensure the service can continue to function without compromising
- **1.3** The service adjustments outlined in this report relates to licensing policy matters that, for the reasons outlined above, needs to be urgently implemented.
- **1.4** This urgent decision is made under the revised scheme of delegation as agreed by Council on 23 March 2020.

2. Licensing policy matters

2.1 Below is a list of urgent licensing policy changes to be implemented.

2.2 It is hard to estimate the length of disruption to service delivery. It is therefore proposed that an initial period of up to the 31st of June 2020 be set for this purpose and that this be reviewed in consultation with the relevant Cabinet Member with responsibility for licensing.

3. Non-Executive Functions

3.1 Table 4, Part 3D of the Council's Constitution –Responsibility for Functions-makes provision for the Chief Executive to take an urgent decision in respect of a nonexecutive function, including a Significant Decision, in a situation where there is not sufficient time for a report to be considered by Council or Appropriate Committee unless it is a decision that in law can only be made by Council. Wherever possible this shall be done in consultation with the Mayor or Appropriate Committee Chair.

4. Alternative options considered

4.1 The authority can opt not to implement these changes but this will have a significant impact on licence holder's ability to continue to trade during the difficult time.
