Executive summary	In January 2021, Gloucestershire County Council allocated £50,000 to Cheltenham Borough Council for the purposes of supporting people made vulnerable due to the Covid-19 pandemic.						
	This report summarises the allocation, distribution and monitoring of the grant.						
Recommendations	The cabinet member healthy lifestyles has agreed to the allocation, distribution of the Winter Grant Scheme funding and notes the numbers of people supported by the scheme.

# 1. Background

- 1.1 The Winter Grants Scheme is funding from the DWP for upper tier LA's to: provide support over the winter to children and households who are experiencing, or at risk of experiencing, poverty, where they are impacted by the ongoing public health emergency and where alternative sources of assistance may be unavailable.
- **1.2** Gloucestershire County Council was allocated £1,507,674.65 and it agreed that £50,000 would be allocated to each of the six District Councils.
- 1.3 The funding aimed to enable each District Council to provide targeted support to vulnerable children and their families, families without children and vulnerable people in their local communities, within the remit of the funding as detailed below.
  - at least 80% of the total funding must be ring-fenced to support households with children, with up to 20% of the total funding to other households experiencing, or at risk of experiencing, poverty during the pandemic.
  - at least 80% of the total funding must be ring-fenced to provide support with food, energy and water bills for household purposes (including drinking, washing, cooking, central heating, and sanitary purposes) and sewerage, or other essentials. Within this condition there is flexibility about the proportion of support allocated to food and to bills.
  - up to 20% of the total funding can be used to provide support with other essentials clearly linked to the scheme conditions (including sanitary products, warm clothing, soap, blankets; boiler service/repair; purchase of equipment including fridges, freezers, ovens, etc.), in recognition that a range of costs may arise which directly affect a household's ability to afford or access food, energy and water.
- 1.4 The availability of the funding was communicated to Cheltenham Borough Council in December with the expectation that the council would devise a scheme with local partners ready to go live by mid to late January 2021 to run for 10 weeks to end of March 2021.
- 1.5 The council had already developed good working relationships with a number of community partners and these relationships were used to develop the Winter Grant Scheme.
