12th December I was honoured to unveil a Civic Society blue plaque to commemorate Dame Sidney Jane Browne at her former address 11 Tivoli Road, where she lived during her retirement until her death in 1941.

Dame Sidney was the first president of the Royal College of Nursing and famously said: "Put a high ideal before you, and do your future service in a greater strength than your own, and your life will be for the betterment of the world."

On Christmas Day, my husband and I spent time at the Open Door Christmas Shelter speaking with people who were there enjoying the good food and company. I would like to place on record my thanks to Open Door and all those who support them to put this annual shelter on to bring Christmas cheer to those in need.

In January I was pleased to be invited to celebrate the role Cheltenham Specsavers has played in the Going the Extra Mile project.
